

MRS. M'CORMICK'S TRAGIC CAREER IS CLOSED BY DEATH

CHICAGO, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Edith Rockefeller McCormick's body lay today in an undertaking parlor a stone's throw from her famous Lake Shore drive home and from the hotel suite where her tragic life ended quietly at 3:40 p. m. yesterday.

Relatives said no funeral arrangements had been made. It was believed, however, she would be buried in a Chicago cemetery near the grave of her first son, John Rockefeller McCormick.

Her brother, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., who visited her during her last illness, was reported returning from the east. It was said that her father, John D. Rockefeller, Sr., would be unable to come because of his advanced age.

All the members of her immediate family, including the two daughters from whom she was estranged for years, were present when the wealthy society leader succumbed to the cancerous disease which she had fought with a vitality that amazed physicians. Physicians said she suffered no pain during the final hours of her life.

A short time after she died, her daughter, Mrs. Mathilde Oser, was led, weeping, from the suite. Others at the bedside when death came were Mrs. Muriel Hubbard, another daughter; Fowler McCormick, son, and his wife, the former Anne (Fifi) Stillman; Harold F. McCormick, her divorced husband; and Edward Krenn, the Swiss architect who had been her friend and business adviser for the last ten years. Major Eliza Dyer Hubbard, Muriel's husband, and Mrs. Fowler McCormick's son, Alexander Stillman, also were present.

The woman who for years ruled Chicago society and in no small measure dictated the entire city's taste in music, was born in Cleveland, O., Aug. 31, 1872. She would have been 60 years old next Wednesday.

Stanwyck Sings In Coming Film

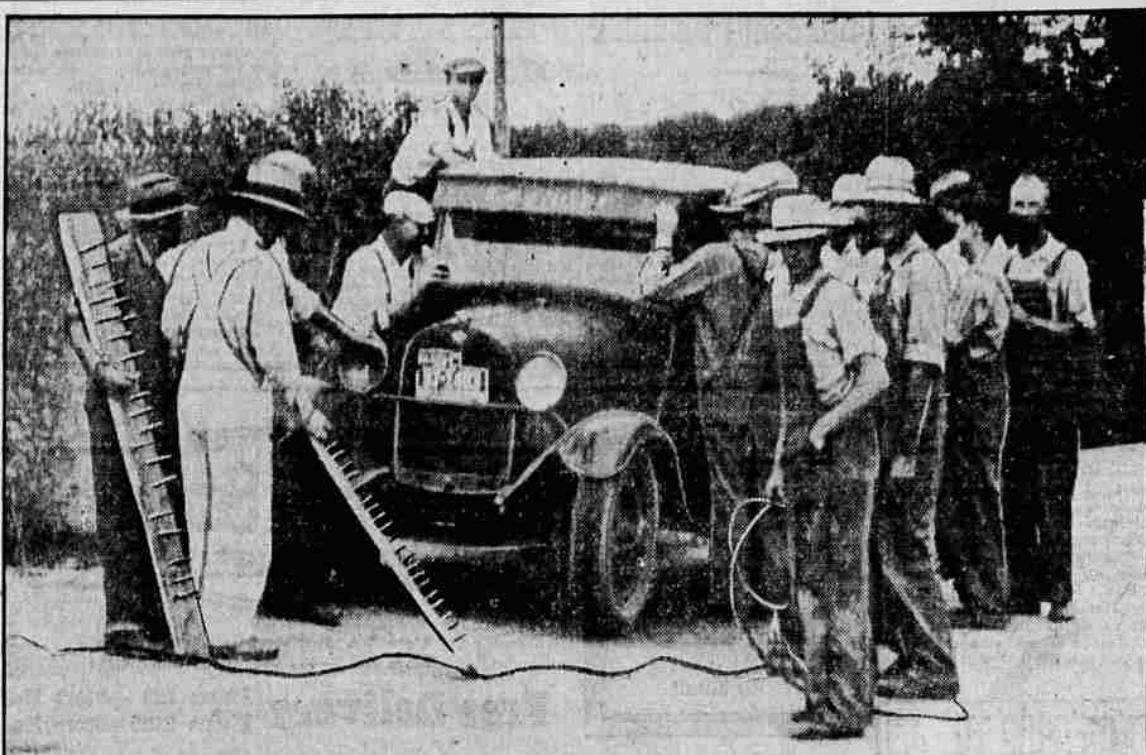

IOWA FARMERS' STRIKE NO PINK TEA PARTY, ANYHOW!



This picture, from the heart of the midwest "farm strike" zone, shows farmers near Sioux City, Iowa, halting a milk truck en route to market in the course of their blockade which is designed to force an increase in the prices they receive. Observe the nail-studded boards that are laid across roads to puncture tires of trucks trying to run the blockade, and the cable that the men are holding. A deadlock ensued when the farmers asked \$2.17 per 100 pounds for their milk, as against the \$1.70 offered by the distributors. Leaders in the "farm strike" movement from several states, attending a meeting of the National Farmers' Holiday Association at Des Moines, declared the movement is spreading.

Soviet Commission To Settle Disputes

MOSCOW.—(AP)—For settling disputes arising between foreign firms and Soviet institutions in connection with foreign trade operations, the Soviet government has organized a special arbitration commission, under the wing of the Soviet chamber of commerce.

Fifteen persons selected will constitute the commission, and its decisions will be considered final.

Each of the parties to a dispute, under the terms of the official decree, will be obliged to appoint an arbitrator from among the 15 commissioners. The two arbitrators, in turn, will agree upon an umpire. This group of three will then proceed to hear the evidence.

Mystery of Old Gold Bed Solved

DEADWOOD, S. D.—(AP)—The "mystery" of an old gold bed extensively mined in the rush days of the Black Hills was declared solved today.

For years, old prospectors were puzzled by the presence of gold in a gulch between Deadwood and Sturgis. The location was far removed from gold-bearing formations, and the miners could not explain why the precious metal should be found.

Recently, while securing specimens for the placer-mining exhibit at the "Days of '70" celebration here, Chas. Werlie, lead, a placer mine operator, "discovered" traces of an old river which would have carried the gold-bearing ore to the gulch.

EUGENE COUNCIL HONORS M'CLAIN

A resolution honoring Carl A. McClain, director of city public utilities, who died recently, has been made public by the Eugene city council. The resolution calls attention to the outstanding work of McClain, both in local and national municipal affairs.

Following is the resolution:

In Memoriam
The Common Council of the City of Eugene officially takes notice of the passing, and laments the loss of a most distinguished citizen.

For a matter of fifteen years, Carl A. McClain has pioneered the principle of municipal ownership; first in the city of Eugene and gradually widening circles, in the state of Oregon and in the United States. His far-sighted genius and sure-footed judgment have built from an insignificant water works plant for the city of Eugene, a public utility which is the generally accepted standard for non-partisan, non-political public ownership.

The Common Council further officially recognizes the passing of a private citizen whose honor, integrity and industry have been and will continue to be a model for all men.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED by the City of Eugene, acting through its duly accredited representatives, that the city as a whole mourns the loss of a citizen who was at once humble and great, virtuous and wise.

The City of Eugene extends to his mother, his wife and his daughter, and his brothers and sister its profound appreciation of the enormously valuable services rendered the city by Carl A. McClain.

King George Sells Russia Some Cows

LONDON.—(AP)—Royal cattle have been sold to Communist Russia, it is understood.

Two short-horn bulls, exhibited by King George at the recent royal agricultural show, have been sold to the Soviet.

The animals are of the famous Eliza and Orange Blossom breeds, and were appreciated by the Russians because of their ruggedness and breed character. They come from the royal farms at Windsor, and were both bred on the king's estates.

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COLONIAL CLOSSES FOR TWO WEEKS

The Colonial theater, which has just completed the most successful summer in its history, closed down Thursday night, to remain dark until Sunday, Sept. 11. It was announced by the management. The two weeks will give the staff time to prepare the theater for the coming season, for which final contracts have been made that will bring a number of outstanding pictures first run, as well as the usual hits subsequent run.

The appointment of a new house manager, John Tweed, who will begin work Sept. 1. Mr. Tweed was connected with the Colonial until last fall, at which time he resigned to take up other work. On his return he will have complete charge of the maintenance of the theater and will supervise all outdoor advertising and exploitation.

When the theater reopens it will have its own stage band, which will appear each Friday and Saturday, and will have a vaudeville policy for each Wednesday night. The band, which has already won the enthusiastic favor of Eugene theatergoers, will be directed by Merle Good, and will include leading musicians of the Pacific coast.

The Oregon Loggers, Lane county's own entertainers, who are now playing at the RKO Orpheum theater in Portland with great success, will come back

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to Eugene for the opening day, Sunday, Sept. 11. They will come here direct from Pendleton, where they will be one of the features of the big roundup.

During the time it is closed the Colonial will be completely renovated and several improvements in equipment will be made. The theater will reopen as one of the most modern and up-to-date in the state.
