COTTAGE GROVE NEWS ITEMS

COTTAGE GROVE, Aug. 25.—(Special).—The county's portable cannery, which operates for the unemployed and needy, had its biggest day of the season here Tuesday, when 620 quarts were handled. Wednesday's pack was 500 quarts and four persons had to be turned away because the cannery could not get to them. The run this week was on carrots, beans, beets, peaches, plums and blackberries. The outfit will be here again Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday next week. The cannery plant is operated exclusively for the needy and can not serve any who are able to do their own canning. Only 50 pounds a day will be accepted from one person and a permit must be secured from O. V. Brees, chairman of the relief council. The cannery takes one can out of six to pay for the use of the cannery and for cans.
