

PUBLIC MARKET OBSERVES PROGRESS

GROWTH SEEN OVER PERIOD OF 17 YEARS

Seventeen years ago, on the opening day of the Producers' Public Market, a scant 25 persons gathered at the Park street location in wagon, a few make-shift stalls, boxes, almost anything that would serve as a counter on which to display their produce.

Now, at the modern market building occupied by the producers, there are 108 regular stalls, modernly equipped stalls, many of them being on wheels every day of the week.

The buying public may be assured that the vegetables, fruit, and other produce they buy at the Public Market is grown in Lane county and is presented to them direct by the producer.

Many changes have been seen in the public market since its opening day, but there are still several market pioneers such as J. C. Ackerson, C. L. Buss, the Myers sisters, Rosina and May, and Mrs. G. L. Cary and many others who have been producing for the market almost ever since it started.

In order to make the public better acquainted with the producers on the market, the Register-Guard publishes herewith short Who's Who on the Public Market. It was impossible to contact every one of the producers since they are not always to be found, but many of them will be found here.

Fred P. Jacobson
Gold fish are not exactly farm produce, but they may be obtained at the two stalls, numbers 38 and 37, operated at the Producers' Public Market by Fred P. Jacobson. He has other produce too, however, for he displays one of the best showings of flowers and bulbs on the market.

Mrs. G. L. Cary
Mrs. G. L. Cary is an old-time producer for the public market, having rented stalls in the market for many years. She is at present occupying stall number 78 on Saturdays. From her vineyard in the College Crest district she brings many varieties of grapes and in addition takes bread which she has on display.

Mrs. W. R. Smith
Pride of the West potatoes are the pride of the W. R. Smith stalls, numbers 24 and 25, at the Producers' Public Market. Mrs. Smith is at the stalls every day where she also handles vegetables, fruits and other farm produce coming from the Smith place in the Yorkville district. Some flowers are also displayed in these stalls and just now cucumbers are one of the features. The Smiths have been producing for the Public Market for the past five years.

Myers Sisters
For the past 13 years, the Myers Sisters, Rosina and May, have been producing for the public market. They now have their stall at number 2. Three times a week they display their produce at this stall, all their produce being raised in their fine garden at Eugene. Their feature is vegetables, with some flowers. String beans of almost every variety may be found here.

J. C. Ackerson
One of the real pioneers on the Producers' Public Market is J. C. Ackerson who was on hand to rent a stall the first day the market opened in its old location near the county jail and who has maintained his stall ever since. One of his specialties at the present time is honey which he displays in attractive form every day. In addition he has potatoes, fruit, and other vegetables along with a few nuts.

Mrs. T. L. Mullins
Another of the newer comers to the public market is Mrs. T. L. Mullins, who greets purchasers from stall number 50 every day of the week. For the last two years Mrs. Mullins has been displaying vegetables and fruits in this stall, all of which are raised on her place on River avenue. She makes a specialty

of her Bonnie Best tomatoes which she displays in great quantities during the tomato season. Her tomatoes all receive excellent care from the time they are planted till the customer buys them at her stall and the number of her "repeaters" testifies to the quality of the tomato she produces.

John Maughan
One of the pioneer peach growers of this section is John Maughan, from whose place near the Ferry street bridge peaches of every variety are brought to the public market every day. Mr. Maughan started growing peaches here in 1890 and has been producing for the public market since its inception, 13 years ago. His produce is in stall 43 where he displays Dewey, Early Crawford, Charlots, Hale, Rochester and Elberta peaches and several other varieties too during the peach season.

R. E. Gansie
Irrigated vegetables are the specialty of the R. E. Gansie displays at the Producers' Public Market. They operate stalls 18 and 19 with Mrs. George Gansie and Elberta peaches and several other varieties too during the peach season.

Sims Brothers
Edgar and Ben Sims, both active in 4-H club work in Lane county, and prize winners in many of the club activities, operate stall 91 in the Producers' Public Market. From their place near Santa Clara they bring their produce to the market every day in the week. The Sims boys have been engaged in fine country raising for some time and feature chickens and eggs at their stall. They have had the stall a year and a half, the boys taking turns running the stall during the week.

C. E. Buss
Sweet corn, in season, is the feature of the C. E. Buss stall, number 56, at the Producers' Public Market where he has been displaying farm produce for ten years. On his farm in the Santa Clara district he displays in stall 63 every day of the week. His produce is all produced with the demands of the consumers as reflected in the Public Market, he says, and he believes this is the best market for the producers in this section.

R. E. Sewzey
Housewives looking for the best pickling cucumbers often end their search at stall 61, on the Public Market, where R. E. Sewzey, of the fertile Santa Clara district, displays his excellent cucumbers three days a week. Besides these, Mr. Sewzey offers melons, tomatoes and other vegetables in season. He has been producing for the public market for three years.

J. W. Richardson
A newcomer to the Public Market is J. W. Richardson who has been producing for the market for a little over a year. From his place in the Santa Clara district, Mr. Richardson brings fruits and vegetables which he displays in stall 63 every day of the week. His produce is all produced with the demands of the consumers as reflected in the Public Market, he says, and he believes this is the best market for the producers in this section.

Mrs. A. Dilly
Poultry products of all kinds are specialized in by Mrs. A. Dilly, who operates stall 35 at the Producers' Public Market. She has been producing for the market nine years. Her place is located on the Pacific highway near Eugene.

F. B. Simmons
Smoked meats and sausages, Rhode Island Red fryers, ham and eggs are featured at stall 58, presided over by F. B. Simmons, who has a farm on the McKenzie highway east of Springfield. Mr. Simmons has his stall three days a week and has been producing for the market for the past five years. He emphasizes the necessity of careful handling of farm meat products so that they reach the customer in "A-1 condition."

C. J. Cook
A thorough believer in irrigation for vegetable production in the Willamette valley, C. J. Cook, who runs stall 76 in the Producers' Public Market, has long made a specialty of irrigated string beans which he displays on the market three days a week. His place is near Goshen where he also raises corn, melons,

stalls 80 and 90 every day at the Producers' Public Market. Produce from the farms at the country club and River Avenue are displayed at these stalls. Mrs. Crafts is in charge of the booths where the irrigated vegetables have been offered for the past year.

P. O. Gunderson
Making a specialty of rabbits, selling both the meat and the pelts, P. O. Gunderson, at stall 87, has been building up his trade in this line for two and one-half years on the Producers' Public Market.

The rabbits are raised on the farm near Trent and Mrs. Gunderson officiates at the market stall. They hope to reach the point where they deal exclusively in rabbits in the near future. White rabbits, New Zealand Reds, Black Giants, and almost every other species of rabbits are raised by the Gundersons who operate their stall every day. In addition to the rabbits, they now offer fruits, vegetables and poultry products.

J. F. Stump
Blue Lake mandarin beans are the specialty of the J. F. Stump display at the Producers' Public Market. Displaying their produce at stall number 75, Mr. and Mrs. Stump are at the market for business five days a week. The Stump place is located on the Camp creek road on fine river bottom land where they raise many vegetables and fruits which they have on display at their stall. They have been market producers for eight years.

C. E. Frye
Making a specialty of her home-canned products, Mrs. C. E. Frye greets customers at the Producers' Public Market from stall number 86. At their farm in the river bottom lands near Santa Clara Mr. Frye produces vegetables, fruits and canned goods which are displayed along with Mrs. Frye's canned produce. Canned pickles are the particular specialties Mrs. Frye is famous for. They have been producing for the public market for only a year, being among the many newcomers this year.

Conley Blossom Farm
In a prominent location in the Producers' Public Market, at stall 82, Mrs. L. R. Gray greets customers every day of the week. She is in charge of the Conley Blossom Farm produce which is raised on the place eight miles east of Springfield on the McKenzie highway. Flower bulbs of all kinds are displayed at this stall, the features being tulips, hyacinths and iris bulbs. The Conley Blossom farm produces virtually every variety of tulip bulb known to be adaptable to this country.

Mrs. Edwin Johnson
An old-time producer for the public market is Mrs. Edwin Johnson, who rents stall number 16 at the market. Presided over by Mrs. H. A. Weldon, this stall is open for business every day of the week. Vegetables, eggs, and chickens from the Johnson farm in the Colaba district are displayed at this stall, with special emphasis being placed on the poultry products.

R. L. McMill
Home-made mayonnaise, honey and bread are the features of the R. L. McMill stall, number 81, at the Producers' Public Market. This stall is operated every day of the week when, besides the above mentioned articles, poultry products, rabbits and some fruits may be seen in this display. Mr. McMill has been a producer for the public market for the past two years and his farm is located on River avenue.

Mrs. G. V. Quiff
When the Public Market first opened in the old shed near the park, Mrs. G. V. Quiff was there displaying a fine line of flowers and vegetables. Even since that time she has been a regular renter at the public market and now occupies stalls number 27 and 28. The stalls are operated every day of the week and the display of flowers is one of the features of her products. Besides flowers, Mrs. Quiff has vegetables and fruits in season. Her place is in the Santa Clara district.

Mrs. S. Thomas Watson
Home baked pastries are the feature of the display carried every Saturday by Mrs. S. Thomas Watson, of the Central district, who operates stall number 74 at the Producers' Public Market. In addition to the home baked pastries, Mrs. Watson displays home-made salads, cottage cheese and baked beans. She has

been operating a stall on the Public Market for two years.

Miss E. L. McCoy
Poultry products and various fruits are displayed at stall number 21 where Miss E. L. McCoy may be found every day. In addition to her eggs, she has many chickens which she brings to the market on Saturdays. She has been renting a stall on the public market for the past year.

Mrs. A. H. Johnson
From the day the Public Market was inaugurated in Eugene, Mrs. A. H. Johnson has been displaying farm produce in stalls rented from the market and today she may be found every day of the week in stall number 11 and 12 at the Producers' Public Market. Beets, carrots and onions are the principal features of Mrs. Johnson's display at present, but she always has a varied line of vegetables during season. Her produce is from the farm in the Willamette district.

W. I. Patrick
For the past seven years W. I. Patrick has been bringing his farm produce to the Producers' Public Market where he now displays his produce in stall 15. This stall is operated three days a week. A varied line of vegetables and fruits is produced on the Patrick farm near the Hayden bridge on McKenzie river where fertile river bottom land makes it easy to produce vegetables of the best quality.

Mrs. L. I. Bonney
Home-baked bread is the feature of stall number 88 where Mrs. L. I. Bonney may be found three days a week in the Producers' Public Market. Rolls and other home-baked foods are featured at this booth. Mrs. Bonney lives in Eugene and has been a regular market producer for two years.

M. E. Weller
Another producer who displays farm products raised in the fertile Hayden bridge district is M. E. Weller, at stall 68 in the Producers' Public Market. Three days a week Mr. Weller displays a wide variety of vegetables and some fruit. During season, he makes a specialty of horse radish. He has been producing for the market for four years.

Mrs. Ethel Olsen
Mrs. Ethel Olsen, at stall 2, makes a specialty of her Cranford peaches and Satsuma plums which are produced at her place near Junction City. She is at her stall every day and has been on the market 10 years, she says. The Satsuma plums is a blood-red fruit, of unusual flavor and attracts many fruit lovers. Besides the plums and peaches, Mrs. Olsen displays other fruits and some vegetables.

O. E. Bishop
Another daily stall renter on the Producers' Public Market is O. E. Bishop, who has his place in the Santa Clara district. Mr. Bishop is rarely in the stall, number 3, S. F. Southard taking care of this end of the business. Fruits and vegetables of all descriptions are featured at this stall.

Mrs. Edwin Stump
For the past two years Mrs. Edw. Stump has been displaying vegetables on the Producers' Public Market. This year she is operating stall number 92. Each day of the week Mrs. Stump has her stall open for business, showing vegetables of all varieties in season.

Charles Shuck
From his farm near the Ferry street bridge, Charles Shuck brings vegetables and fruits three days a week to be displayed at his stall number 79. Most of the time Melba Andrews, noted 4-H club girl of this

county, presides at the stall. Mr. Shuck has been producing for the Producers' Public Market for some time and always plans his crops so that he has the best quality of all varieties to offer during their respective seasons.

Mrs. W. C. Myers
Vegetables, featured by radishes, all grown in irrigated land, are the specialty of Mrs. W. C. Myers, who operates stall 13 at the Producers' Public Market three days a week. Thirty acres of irrigated vegetables are raised at the Myers place on the Camp creek road near Hayden bridge and Mrs. Myers has maintained her stall on the public market for the past eight years. Fall vegetables are one of the principal products of the Myers place and every fall the stall is crowded with this fall produce.

Mrs. Iva Anderson
One of the newer producers for the Public Market is Mrs. Iva Anderson who displays her produce in stall 20. Mrs. Anderson operates her stall three days a week and from her place in Paradise valley, on the McKenzie river, she brings a complete line of vegetables to the market. She has been renting a stall for the past year.

Dena Archambeau
Dena Archambeau may be found in stall 35 at the Producers' Public Market, displaying her selections of vegetables, fruits and flowers. She lives at 1565 Franklin street and is a new comer to the market, this being her first year there.

Mrs. Roy Moore
Vegetables and fruits, of almost every variety, may be seen in season at stall 59, presided over by Mrs. Roy Moore, of Jasper. Mrs. Moore has her stall three days a week. She has been selling on the market three years now, starting about the same time the market moved to its present location.

Roy R. Miller
The fertile area along the McKenzie river in the Hayden bridge section produces much of the produce sold on the Public Market. Roy R. Miller has his farm in this section and on three days a week brings a complete line of vegetable and fruits to his stall, number 29. He has been producing for the market during the past year.

C. H. Paddock
Winter plants, produced in his greenhouses in Springfield, are the specialty of C. H. Paddock, who operates stall number 83 at the Producers' Public Market. Mr. Paddock makes a point of having February plants on the market every year, featuring vegetables and some flowers. Greenhouse tomatoes and cucumbers are features at this particular time and many other vegetables and annual flowering plants are to be found at this stall. Mr. Paddock operates his stall every day and has been on the market for two years.

D. J. Calvert
Poultry products are the specialty of D. J. Calvert, who holds forth at stall 49 in the Producers' Public Market on Saturdays. Mr. Calvert's place is on the Pacific highway south of Eugene and he has been a producer for the Public Market many years. Fryers are his chief product at this season.

Mrs. Carl Weber
During every week day, orders for dressed chickens are taken at the stall operated by Mrs. Carl Weber and on Saturdays the chickens are brought to the market where they are on display at stall 50. In addition to the chickens, of which her chief features are Rhode Island Reds and White Leghorns, Mrs. Weber also has vegetables on display. She has been a market producer for the last six years, her place being located on River avenue.

C. R. Brechtbill and C. M. Bissell
Vegetables, berries and fruits are

on display every day at stalls 73 and 74, operated by C. R. Brechtbill and C. M. Bissell at the Producers' Public Market. They are both old timers on the Public Market, having been at the old location. Their produce is from the River Avenue district.

Mrs. F. Arnold
Fruits and poultry products are featured by Mrs. F. Arnold, who has stall 84 at the Producers' Public Market. This stall is operating every day of the week. Mrs. Arnold is connected with the market for the past two years. Produce displayed at the stall is from the farm on River Avenue. This is another producer whose product is calculated to supply the wants of the public market buyers. All produce is given special attention in regard to appearance and quality and comes to the market in the best of condition, ready for the consumer.

Mrs. R. S. Wynd
Flowers every day of the year. That is the aim of Mrs. R. S. Wynd, who operates stalls number 66 and 67 at the Producers' Public Market. And she is able to attain that aim, too, since her greenhouses produce enough varieties of flowers to allow her to have them on display at the market every day of the year. She has been a regular market stall renter for the past six years.

E. V. Bissell
High quality pure pork country sausage, meat loaves, roast pork and other meats are featured at the E. V. Bissell stall number 72 at the Producers' Public Market, open to business every day. Meats sold in this stall are slaughtered at approved slaughter houses under state inspection. Mr. Bissell's plant is located in the Chase Gardens district and his stall is operated by Mrs. Bissell, he is an old-timer on the market, having been connected with the market at the old location, leaving it for a year or so while he was out of the state, and coming back a year or so ago.

C. F. Clark
C. F. Clark of the Colaba district, is another newcomer to the Producers' Public Market where he displays in stall 54 an excellent line of potatoes every day in the week. Mr. Clark produces other vegetables in season, but pays particular attention to his potatoes which are of the best quality.

A. F. Weber
To satisfy that demand for home-baked goods, customers of the Producers' Public Market often shop at the stall of A. F. Weber, number 51, where a plentiful supply of home-baking is always available on Saturdays. In addition to this line, Mr. Weber displays fruits and vegetables in season and also has a fine line of eggs. His place is near Creswell and he is one of the old-timers on the market.

Gladys Seamen
For those delightful, home-grown, home-made sweet pickles, visitors at the Producers' Public Market go to stall 8 where Gladys Seamen displays her line of sweet pickles. From her place on Howard's lane come the cucumbers from which these pickles are made and she is present at the market three days a week. Besides pickles she displays berries and fruits and has been producing for the market two years.

Mrs. Robert Brown
Making a specialty of eggs, chickens and vegetables, Mrs. Robert Brown greets customers at the Producers' Public Market three days a week from stall number 9. Most of her chickens are brought to the market on Saturday only. Her place is

in the Pleasant Hill section and she has been producing for the public market for the past year.

Mrs. Charles Wagner
Poultry and dairy products are featured at stall 94, operated by Mrs. Charles Wagner. This stall is open every day during the week, and eggs, butter, cheese, fruit and vegetables are brought from the Wagner place in the Central district and displayed at the stall.

C. G. Rear
Green Gage plums are what attract the eye of the visitor to the Producers' Public Market when they reach the domain of C. G. Rear in stall 6. This fruit, along with many other fruits, all produced on the Rear place on River avenue, are displayed every day on the market at this stall. In addition to the fruit display there may be found vegetables, featured by tomatoes. Mr. Rear has been producing for the market for two years.

Co-operative Farm
At stall number 85 in the Producers' Public Market, Eugene Wright displays the produce grown at the Co-operative farm on the old Coburg road. This stall is operated every day. Vegetables are the chief product displayed at this stall, though some fruits are at hand during season. This is the first year this group has been in operation on the market.

Mrs. Kathaleen Dyer
Making a specialty of home-made cookies, Mrs. Kathaleen Dyer, of the Junction City district, operates stall number 71 on the Producers' Public Market three days a week. In addition to the cookies, she displays home-baked goods, featuring angel food cakes and many varieties of vegetables. She has been a producer on the market for the past nine years.

John Moore
One of the best known producers on the Public Market is John Moore, who has been a steady stall renter almost from the inception of the idea of a public market in this county. Mr. Moore is at present to be found in stall 10 at the Producers' Public Market where he holds forth three days a week. At his stall he displays a varied line of vegetables during the season and he also has some fruits and poultry products. Moore's place is in the rich river bottom land past the Eugene country club. He makes a specialty of growing an excellent grade of potatoes.

Mrs. August Juhl
An old-timer on the Producers' Public Market, Mrs. August Juhl has been displaying her fruit, vegetables and poultry products on the market for the past ten years. Her place is on the River road and three days every week she brings her produce to her stall at the market. Tomatoes and peaches are the principal items in her display this summer.

E. C. Riensche
Fine displays of vegetables and poultry products may be found at stall 14, presided over by E. C. Riensche every Saturday at the Producers' Public Market. A pioneer in producing for the market, the Riensches have been growing vegetables on their farm near Elmira for many years, selling on the public market.

M. P. Elder
All during the year visitors at the Producers' Public Market can find elder displayed at the stall of M. P. Elder, number 26. Apples and elder are the specialty at this stall and the owners make it a point to have elder on hand all the year around. In addition to this they display other fruit and vegetables. The stall is open three days a week. The farm is located in the Bailey Hill district.

H. G. Denham
A large assortment of irrigated vegetables is to be found at the H. G. Denham stall, number 70, at the Producers' Public Market. The Denham farm is pointed toward production of high quality vegetables, irrigation being used on all the produce brought to the public market here. This farm is located north of Eugene near the Ferry street bridge and Denham have been producing for the public market for the past six years.
