A coward! A shirker of all moral responsibility where the children's health or welfare were concerned.

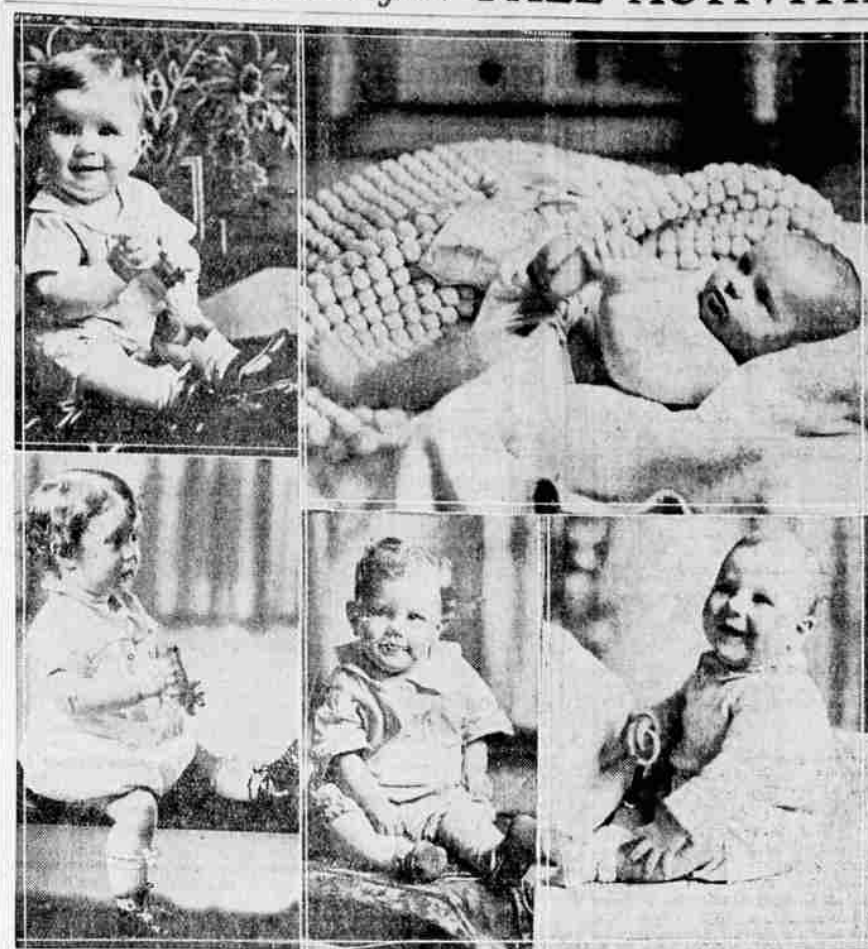
