

Callison Awaits Opening of 1932 Coast Football Season September 10

SOPHOMORES WILL GET BIG CHANCE ON OREGON TEAM

Prince G. "Prink" Callison, new University of Oregon head football coach, is awaiting with impatience the opening of the 1932 football season Sept. 10. On that date, Prink will step officially into big time coaching circles and with a heavy schedule to meet him, will waste no time in settling down to business.

The players are as anxious as Callison to get started. Eric Forsta, ed. Some of them are already on hand but the majority will begin arriving late next week. Letters have been received from all players out of the state and they will be back.

The new Webfoot mentor plans to lose no time. Scrimmage may take place the first afternoon the players report and if any of them are not in shape it will be just too bad for them.

Sophomores Hopeful
The freshmen of 1931 will have a golden opportunity to make good. With Santa Clara, Washington and U.C.L.A. scheduled on successive week-ends, Prink will not only utilize all of his varsity players, but will have to depend to a great extent on the sophomores.

Callison is worried about the center of the line and he makes no secret about it. With Eric Forsta, veteran pivot man, graduated, and with ex-Captain Schulz, star guard, also missing from the squad, the middle of the line doesn't look so good. Bernie Hughes is back at one guard, but as he is a fine center, he may be given the assignment of passing the ball, so both guards are likely to be sophomores.

Two regular tackles—Captain Morgan and Biff Nilsson—will be back, but Callison wants to develop four more tackles to alternate with them. The same holds for the ends, where both Bailey and Wishard are back, but here again there is an opportunity for four wingmen to assist and alternate with them.

Backs Return

All of last year's regular backs are on hand, but there undoubtedly will be some changing there as Callison desires more punch among his ball carriers. Temple and Gee, the half-backs last year, will find plenty of competition from these sophomores: Howard Bobbitt, sub quarterback last year; Parker, Brown and several others. Terjeson and Bevan, sophomores, are Bowserman's chief rivals for the signal-calling job, while Mikulek has no rivals at fullback, but will have a number of underdogs, including Howard Bolt, a quarterback last year.

The ticket sale for the Shrine game, between U.C.L.A. and Oregon at Multnomah stadium October 15, has reached the 2000 mark, although the pastboards were mailed out but a week ago. If the enthusiasm continues, the Webfoots and the Bruins will play before a great crowd. U.C.'s stock went up a notch last week when it was announced that California and U.C.L.A. had entered into a long agreement for home-and-home games.

TROJANS EXPECT 16 LETTERMEN TO RETURN FOR PLAY



LOS ANGELES, Aug. 26.—(Special)—Sixteen letter winners of the 1931 University of Southern California football squad are expected to return to the Trojan fold when gridiron practice at S. C. starts Sept. 10. Thirteen of last year's letter men are lost to the squad by graduation.

Tay Brown, included in this group being seven members of the '31 starting lineup.

Captain-elect Tay Brown and Ernie (Foot) Smith, tackles; Ray Sparling, end, and Larry Stevens, guard, who are the four returning Trojan regulars, are expected to retain their old jobs. Brown, who now weighs 202 pounds, and Smith, who bounces the beam at the 212-mark, have had two years of varsity experience and should make S. C. unusually strong at the tackle positions.

Stevens is a cinch for his old job at standing guard, but Sparling is expected to get plenty of competition for his left end position from Johnny Seixas, former Alhambra high and Pasadena Junior college star who was the outstanding lineman on the S. C. Spartan squad last year.

In addition to Brown, Smith, Sparling and Stevens, the returning letter men include Ory Mohler and Homer Griffith, quarterbacks; Gordon Clark and Kenneth Fay, halfbacks; Dick Barber, fullback; Aaron Rosenberg, John Dye and Frank Williamson, guards; Byron Gentry and Curtis Youel, centers; Ford Palmer, end, and Bob Eskrine, tackle who may be used this year at fullback.

Mohler, who has proven one of the slipperiest ball carriers in Trojan history and who is exceptionally rugged for his 165 pounds, is expected to be the ace of the S. C. backfield at the signal calling job which in the Howard Jones system is also the triple threat spot.

Rosenberg will step into Johnny Baker's running guard post, while Gordon Clark is a cinch for Tom Mallory's old position at left half. Ford Palmer has the edge on Ward Browning of the freshmen for the right end spot vacated by Garrett Arbelbide. Other reserves of last year's squad of letter winners who are returning are expected to have a struggle with members of last year's fresh eleven for starting positions on the Trojan eleven.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—That remarkable athlete Babe Didrikson is getting ready to compete in the women's national golf championship beginning at Salem, Mass., Sept. 26, but that is such a long way off that we feel prompted to make a few suggestions as to how the Babe might spend a few idle moments of her time meanwhile.

It strikes me that the Babe ought to go in for a little variety. She can run, jump, play basketball, toss the javelin and discus or whatever happens to be handy; she can play a respectable game of golf with gents years her senior, and she can cook, sew, write, turn handspindles and, possibly, could play the dulcimer if properly introduced.

But she hasn't swum the English channel yet, and what could be a better conditioner for a golf tournament? Think of the pounds she would take on in the cold water—and how much would add to her tremendous drives!

Might Be Jockey
Also, she hasn't ridden a winning race on Equipse before swimming the channel, and if you remember what the pictures of channel swimmers looked like, you know why.

Just as a preliminary warmup, how about a finish match, no-holds-barred with either Strangler Lewis or Jim London? Shouldn't this be a great help to her putting at Salem, and Babe says she isn't such a good putter, you know. She could practice putting the Strangler into ringriders' laps.

A bout with Primo Carnera suggests itself. That, it seems to me, would be a natural for Madison Square Garden and would fill that bowl at Long Island City as it never has been filled before.

- 4—Matriculate at Notre Dame in order to play quarterback.
- 5—Sign a contract to pitch for the New York Yankees.
- 6—Enter the Pacific coast dog-rolling tournament.
- 7—Engage in a special match with Sidney Franklin, the bull fighter.
- 8—Battle Helen Wills for the world's tennis supremacy.
- 9—Drive Marchioness to a new world's trotting record.
- 10—Run from coast to coast.
- 11—Climb the Matterhorn.
- And, after that, she ought to be in pretty good shape to play golf.

HIGHCLIMBER takes km over

Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Davis, of San Francisco, will be guests of Mr. and Mrs. Fred G. Stickels here Monday. The Davises, formerly of Sydney, Australia, are en route to New York City.

Perhaps that sounds more like a society note than a sports column but "Dave" Davis was the owner of Phar Lap, the Australian "Wonder Horse," who died in California this spring following his record breaking run in the Agua Caliente handicap.

Davis is the man who, on the advice of his trainer and friend, Tedford, purchased Phar Lap for \$800 as a two-year-old. The young gelding repaid their confidence in him by winning something like \$350,000. Death cut short what would probably have been a phenomenal career on the American turf.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis spent two weeks here last summer as guests of the Stickels' but will probably stop here only a short time on their way east. When Mr. and Mrs. Stickels were in Australia in 1929, they were guests of the Davises for a time and saw Phar Lap run his first race for the Melbourne cup, finishing third. The following year the great horse finished first and he made a habit of finishing first after that.

There may never be another horse like Phar Lap. Huge of build and strong of limb, he ran with a great, weaving stride and was a handsome animal in action. He was as calm as a work horse on the track or off it and never gave the starters trouble at the post.

It was perhaps an accident that Davis bought Phar Lap in the first place. Tedford, the trainer, had seen the horse in action as a two-year-old and admired him. He lacked the capital for his purchase and agreed to feed and train Phar Lap if Davis would buy him. A bargain was struck and Phar Lap became Davis' property.

Davis made a lot of money with the horse, and won considerable fame. But it was the loss of a fine animal and not the loss of a paying investment that saddened Davis when the horse died this spring. The horseman had hoped to see the big gelding win as easily in his eastern races as he had done at Caliente when he romped home ahead of the field and set a new handicap record. Phar Lap had to carry 120 pounds in the Caliente race. He had been forced to carry as high as 150 pounds in the Melbourne cup races and was classed as the greatest weight carrier since Carbine ran in Australia 40 years ago.

Phar Lap was the son of Night Raid and Zulu, and boasted good breeding but none of his ancestors could touch him for speed and endurance.
