taken after hold strikers had entered the city and picketed three thoroughfares.
Sheriff Charles B. McDonald at the same time announced he would not swear in additional deputies, and that his regular men would be too busy with routine duties to pay much attention to the picketing.
McDonald earlier had asserted Gov. Bryan should call out the militia if he wanted to keep the highways open.
Several clashes between pickets and truckers were narrowly averted during the morning. One farmer escorted his produce through the lines with a shotgun. Another drove his truck at full speed toward a line of strikers formed across the road.
They jumped aside barely in time to avoid being hit. A third man was slightly cut when the windshield of his truck was broken by a thrown club.
