

BUYERS CONTRACT FOR LANE DRIED PRUNES, 3 CENTS

Outside buyers are now contracting with Lane county prune growers for the dried product at a top price of 3 cents a pound, according to information given out Tuesday. At this price it is figured that there will be a small margin of profit for the growers, and a decision to pick the crop has been made during the past few days by quite a number who had previously planned to allow the prunes to remain on the trees.

Walter P. Fell, who has represented Rosenberg Bros., one of the largest prune buying firms in the country, for the past few years, announced Tuesday that he has recently contracted for 111 tons of Lane county dried prunes during the past few days.

In estimating the cost of picking and drying the prunes it is figured that the grower will receive a profit of a cent a pound at the top price offered at the present time. Even if the profit is less than that, and the grower only does a little better than to break even, he is distributing considerable money in the community if he decides to pick his prunes and have them dried, it is pointed out.

The prices being paid by the buying firm which Mr. Fell represents is as follows, for dried Italian prunes:

For 30-35s and 35-40s, 3 cents a pound; 40-42s, 2 1/2 cents; 42-45s, 2 1/2 cents; 45-50s, 2 1/2 cents; 50-55s, 2 cents; 55-60s, 1 3/4 cents; 60-65s, 1 1/2 cents; 65-70s, 1 1/4 cents, and from that size on down 1 cent.

The price being offered for the Petite variety is the same as for Italians and for date prunes just one-half.

CARSON TO SPEAK ON DEMO PROGRAM

Joseph K. Carson of Portland, who helped draw the democratic platform at Chicago, will speak on the platform Wednesday at 8 p. m. in the circuit court room of the courthouse. The meeting is open to the public and indications are that a large crowd will hear the speaker.

With Carson will be Lynn Black of Dallas, also a delegate to the national convention.

The meeting is sponsored by the Women's Democratic League of Lane County, and is the first rally of either major political party to be held here.

Carson is running for mayor of Portland. He is well known among democrats, as he was formerly secretary of the state central committee. He will be introduced by L. L. Ray of Eugene.

Cannery to Help Needy of County

The Gold Beach Cannery company will help the needy people of Lane county by donating canned salmon, according to word received Monday afternoon by County Judge C. P. Barnard.

The cannery company's offer was prompted by the over-supply of salmon in the commercial fishing streams and by the need for aid over the state. Ten thousand pounds of salmon are to be canned by the company and shipped to the counties. Multnomah county will get 5000 pounds, and the rest will be divided among the other counties. Only the cost of the cans will be charged the counties.

Judge Barnard was asked how much Lane county might use, and he replied for any share up to 1000 pounds that might be deemed appropriate by the committee, which will distribute the salmon. Paul V. Maris of O. S. C. is chairman.

CAREFREE HOLMAN TELLS OF TROUBLE WITH BILL EINZIG

Rufus Holman, state treasurer, at peace with the world, including his associates in the Meier administration, passed through Eugene Tuesday on the way to Medford to represent the governor at the dedication of Jackson county's new courthouse.

That row with Einzig? Mr. Holman read affidavits of his secretary and other office employees as to the language the state purchasing agent used when he got a letter from Holman asking if he had accepted free medical service for himself at the state hospital.

"What would you do if an employee used such language in the presence of women?" inquired Mr. Holman.

As to Einzig's work as purchasing agent, Holman had no criticism, except that Einzig had a habit of calling for bids on an article and then playing the low bidder against each other for still lower prices.

"I told Einzig to stop it," said Mr. Holman. "The state doesn't want to break the people it does business with, now does it?"

Holman insisted that the inquiry into Einzig's alleged use of state medical services was of a purely routine nature and not intended as a step in "getting" the purchasing agent.

"Complaints had come to me," said Mr. Holman, "and I wrote to Einzig and asked him to write me what he had to say about them."

Mr. Holman claims the Einzig situation has not altered his relations with the governor, although the governor has not yet acted on Holman's demand for Einzig's dismissal.
