Babies understand much, but sense more. Everything we say affects their future behavior.

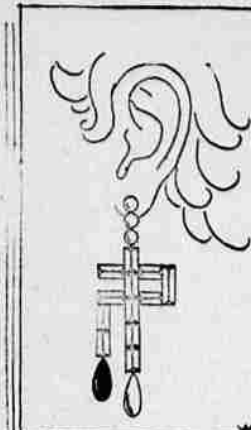
Bobby was not only selfish. His was a do-in-the-manner attitude. This very thing is ruining the world today. Parents can influence future generations against it.

Today's Recipes

LIMA beans come into market in abundance in late August and early September. These beans are a heartier food than the green beans of summer, and according to the manner of serving, add many calories to the diet. Lima beans are almost four times richer in calories than string beans, but the vitamin content of the green beans is much higher than that of lima. Green beans are classed with the leafy vegetables as a "protective food."

There are several varieties of lima beans, tiny green ones, large green ones and large flat white ones, but they must all be gathered for immediate use before the milk becomes firm inside the tender shell-like covering. As the beans ripen, this covering grows hard and difficult to digest and the creamy center becomes dry and unpalatable. No matter how long the beans are cooked, these conditions cannot be altered nor the vegetable improved.

The best way to serve lima beans that have been allowed to become overripe is to rub them through a sieve after cooking and use them in a puree or soufflé. This removes the tough, indigestible covering, but of course does not restore the delicate flavor.

Since beans are lacking in fat, this must be furnished in the seasoning. The most delicious way to serve lima beans is in pure cream. One-half cup cream seasoned with salt and pepper and added to two cups of cooked lima beans makes the addition of butter quite unnecessary. Heat cream to scalding point after pouring over beans but do not let boil. The cream coats the beans lightly and prevents the dryness so many people dislike in lima beans.

If cream is not at hand, a thin sauce the consistency of thick cream can be substituted. Two tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon flour and 1-2 cup milk are the proportions to use to produce the sauce.

Always cook limas in as little water as possible and cook uncovered. Let the water cook away or use it in the sauce. If you add salt when the beans are put on to cook, there's danger of toughening the covering, but they have a better flavor if the salt is "cooked in" for half the cooking period. Allow thirty to forty minutes for beans to cook and form the habit of shaking the pan in which they are cooking. The flattening of lima beans often causes them to stick to the bottom of the pan and scorch even when there is plenty of water over them. Shaking the pan prevents this without crushing the beans, as stirring would.
