WHEN we were little children at home we used to play school. That was before I had been ushered into Number One on a certain bright September day up in the old North Avenue Second Ward where Mr. Daniels was principal and Miss Anderson scored slates with double lines by means of a broken pointed pen, and got everything ready to teach us babies our A B C's.

It was all just play and I had a good time, especially on those occasions when the officers were in a particularly amiable mood and decided the "school" wasn't so bad after all, and I was "deared" and "honored" to death. Those days I got big 100's on my slate in every color of chalk then made.

I don't think I ever got a turn at being anything but the goat, however.

Well—came the day, as I said before, when my mother dressed me in my best, and took me up to the real school.

I had never seen Mr. Daniels, although I knew him so well, I had never seen Miss Anderson, but I knew all about her.

A Day of Fight My heart was in my shoes and I could scarcely move for fright. I did not see that Mr. Daniels' eyes behind his thick glasses were kindly and
