COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Sept. 5.—Col. George Hutchinson, pilot of his family on a leisurely flight from New York to London, was granted permission today by the Greenlandic Trading company to fly from Godthaab, Greenland, to Angmagssalik, and to use fuel originally left at Godthaab for Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

At Angmagssalik he will be permitted to use fuel deposited there for Robert Cramer, American flyer, lost while attempting a flight similar to Hutchinson's.

Mickey Mouse Not Hit By Depression

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 5.—(AP)—One of Hollywood's most famous stars and yet one who has no home with a swimming pool, Mickey Mouse, is not going to curtail expenditures. A film production program budgeted at \$243,000 for the year has been set aside for Mickey Mouse by his creator, Walt Disney. Of this sum, \$325,000 represents salaries to be paid by the studio. Ten of the sound cartoons will be made in color. The first Mickey Mouse cartoon was made in a garage.

FISH MONGER HELD IN LINDBERGH CASE HAS STRANGE TALE

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Sept. 5.—(AP)—The strange story of Garret Schenck, 40, Hopewell, N. J., fish monger, that he was kidnapped and held captive by a private detective for 70 days following the Lindbergh baby kidnapping occupied the attention of federal, state and county investigators today. Schenck was found Saturday in a mountain cabin and brought to Johnstown. He said while he sold fish to Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, he had never seen their baby. After being questioned all Saturday night, Schenck was taken to Clearfield yesterday. He is voluntarily in the custody of Sheriff Ira McCloskey of Clearfield county. He says he will not leave until all angles of the case are cleared up.
Schenck said that while his captors treated him "all right," he was constantly afraid of what might happen to him. He says he was too frightened to sleep "because they had guns there and I was afraid that if I went to sleep I wouldn't get awake alive."
Schenck was freed after he persuaded one of his guards to tell Mayor Eddie McCloskey of Johnstown of his plight.

WOMEN'S AIRPLANE RECORD SHATTERED

CLEVELAND, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Mae Halzlip today shattered the existing women's world airplane speed record by more than 43 miles an hour as she stroked four times along the three kilometer course at an average of 253.959 miles an hour. She streaked along the course a fifth time, however, in an effort to raise the mark still further and her average of 268.7 miles an hour on that lap raised the prospective record to 255.513 miles per hour. Any four consecutive laps may be counted toward the record which must be calibrated and approved by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

Chicago Stirred By Three Blasts

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Three blasts, all of undetermined origin and occurring within a 24-hour period in the same northwest side neighborhood, wrecked three houses, damaged two others, and caused injuries to seven persons.
The latest of the explosions took place early today. It followed the first by 24 hours. The second occurred a few hours after the first.
Police and firemen were conducting a joint inquiry. The opinion was advanced by them that at least two of the blasts were incendiary in origin.

Jury Still Out On Egan-Tinnin Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Surrounded by grim relics of the death of Mrs. Jessie Scott Hughes, a jury of seven men and five women today entered its third day of deliberating the fate of Frank J. Egan, ousted public defender, and Albert Tinnin, former convict.
Jurors considering murder charges against the pair apparently were no nearer a verdict than when they retired at 11:12 a. m. Saturday.

MOSCOW, Sept. 5.—Biographies of Joseph Stalin, Vladimir Molotov and other Kremlin personalities are in the process of composition by leading Soviet literary men. Publication in connection with the 15th anniversary of the revolution, next November.
The initiative in the project is said to have been Maxim Gorki's. Presumably, he is one of the authors collaborating on the series of biographical sketches, with Stalin most likely as his subject.

SOLDIERS RESCUE CONSULAR PARTY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Three young American consular officers reported captured by brigades in northwest Persia and subsequently rescued by soldiers, were safe today but the state department had no further word of their status.

A cable from Charles C. American minister at Tehran of their capture on the night of September 1, and added that the "appear to have been rescued" Persian troops.

The captured men were Robert Strepper, Columbus, Ohio, consular third secretary of legation at Tehran; Cyril L. F. Thiel, Chicago, consul at Jerusalem; Thomas Hickox, Rochester, Pa., vice-consul at Jerusalem.

They were en route from Baghdad to Tehran by motor car, and reported to have been seized by Ratsork pass, midway between Hamshah and Hamadan. This has been guaranteed as Persian many years by the Persian government.
