

FLOOD DEATH TOLL INCREASES TO 13

DALLAS, Tex., Sept. 7.—(AP)—The death toll from floodwaters that followed unprecedented rains in widely separated sections of Texas mounted to 13 today, with property damage running into the millions of dollars.

Four Californians, Mrs. George Mullens, 50, and her three small children were drowned in Elm creek near Abilene in central Texas.

Nine persons were drowned earlier in the week by flood waters of the Rio Grande which today stood at the highest stage on record in its lower valley.

The Rio Grande today isolated the little town of Hidalgo, marooning 200 persons. They had an ample food supply. New levees thrown up during the night were believed strong enough to protect the town from inundation.

sanitation commission and personal physician to former Mayor Walker, will be reduced to \$12,000 from his present \$22,500.

The heads of the police and fire departments will be reduced \$3,000 a year to get within the \$12,000-a-year maximum.

The city payroll was found to have increased 48 per cent since 1920. The mayor also ordered a systematic census by police to determine the number of destitute unemployed in the city and the percentage of them who are permanent residents.

The mayor's voluntary reduction in his own salary leaves him lower paid than at least one other official, Comptroller Charles W. Berry, an elected officer, receives \$35,000 a year.

McKee took two other steps toward strengthening the city's financial position. With Comptroller Berry he made a flying trip to Wall street and there, in less than 30 minutes, he arranged a loan of between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000 at the lowest rate of interest paid by the city since last November, 5 1/2 per cent.

At a meeting of the board of estimate he led a move which resulted in the ending of a virtual printing monopoly by insisting that the low bidder be given the contract on the printing of election ballots. The election board sought to award the contract to the high bidder. The saving amounted to \$50,000.

A communist committee which called to ask if the mayor would meet a committee on unemployment Saturday was told he would be glad to discuss the problem with the committee.
