Von Papen Government Has Good Start In Elections

(Eugene Press Staff Correspondent) REILIN, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The German government of Chancellor Franz Von Papen, given an overwhelming vote of confidence, nevertheless appeared today to have a more favorable start in the near general election, after the chancellor had dissolved the Reichstag, one of the most dramatic scenes in German parliamentary history. The government warned the opposition that forces would be used if necessary to prevent deputies from assembling. It decided, however, that martial law or other strict measures were not necessary after the Reichstag attempt to call a Reichstag election today was abandoned. The defense by the Reichstag, when the opposition led by the Nazis refused to accept dissolution as legal, was quickly decided to cancel a

CROSSLEY LEADS GOLFERS TUESDAY

Massachusetts Player Is Pace Setter In Final Qualifying Rounds

BALTIMORE COUNTRY CLUB, Md., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Wilfred Crossley 19, Dedham, Mass., was the pace setter today as second and final qualifying rounds of the national amateur golf championship were played.

This year's Massachusetts junior champion had an aggregate of 144, which should place him among the first half dozen of the 32 players to qualify for match play starting tomorrow.

He scored 72, two over par, in today's round, and made a 75 Monday. His 33 going out today was the lowest score for nine holes made thus far in the tournament, but erratic putting made him write down a 30 for his incoming nine.

Johnny Robbins of Portland, Ore., tied him by qualifying when he turned in a 77 today for an aggregate of 151.

Jack Westland of Chicago, who had a stroke behind Crossley, Westland, runner up to Champion Francis Ouimet in 1931, went out in par 35 today but skidded to 40, five over par, on the incoming nine to total 75 for the round.

Next came Charley Seaver, the youngest from Los Angeles, with 368 on each of today's nines, a round total of 72 and a grand total of 147.

Others safely within the qualification limit were George Voigt, New York, 148; W. J. Blaney, West Newton, Mass., 149; John R. Parker, Jr., W. Orange, N. J., 149; Lawson Little, San Francisco, 150; Maurice McCarthy, Harrison, N. Y., 150; M. P. Warner, New Haven, Conn., 151.

Big Deficit Found In Insull Accounts

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A deficit of \$220,310,976 in the accounts of Insull Utility Investments, Inc., was reported to the federal district court today by auditors for the receivers. The auditors said they found "inconsistencies in the accounting records of the company" and suggested that consistent records through the years of the investment company's operations in Insull Utility Securities would have shown losses throughout the period. The report listed assets at only \$27,475,364.

SMITH SEEKS BONUS VIEWS OF CANDIDATES

"Happy Warrior" Voices His Disapproval Of Last Legislation

EXPENSES TOO HIGH

Right To Compensation Is Upheld But Methods Declared Wrong

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Alfred E. Smith today called upon the candidates for president to tell the people what they intend to do about the soldiers bonus problem. The demand by the democratic party's 1928 candidate for the presidency was set forth in a copyrighted argument written by Mr. Smith for the Saturday Evening Post published today.

Platforms Reviewed

Smith reviewed the platforms of the two major political parties. The republican platform suggested a study with a view to eliminating the "inequalities and injustices and effecting all possible economies." The democratic platform, while much briefer, called for a "full measure of justice to all war veterans who have suffered disability."

MONEY ALLOTTED TO FLOOD CONTROL

The war department has allotted money for flood work on the Willamette river near Eugene, according to dispatches from the national capital Tuesday.

Under the act of congress to relieve flood conditions, \$180,000 was allotted to the upper Willamette and Yamhill rivers. Every year, some flood are put on the Willamette between Oregon City and Salem to keep the channel clear, but the size of the appropriation leads Eugeneans to believe that Eugene's request for flood control money on the Willamette has been approved. No notification has been received by the chamber of commerce yet.

Clearing of sand in the channel and construction of wing dams and dikes will be done on the Willamette near here with the newly allotted funds, it is believed.

Although the war department money available \$41,477,290. The Mississippi river, the Alleghany river in Pennsylvania and Los Angeles and Long Beach harbors received the latest appropriation.

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Lois Pierce, 3, and Gerald Thacker, 4, died today from suffocation and burns received late Monday when fire destroyed the W. E. Pierce home here.

Assassin To Pay Penalty On Guillotine

PARIS, Sept. 13.—(AP)—President Albert Lebrun today rejected the final appeal for the life of Paul Gorguloff, slayer of former President Paul Doumer, and the Russian was ordered guillotined tomorrow. Even before formal announcement of the execution, passes were being issued by the prefecture of police for the occasion. Father Gillet, a priest of the Greek orthodox church, arrived to administer last rites of Gorguloff. The execution probably will take place at dawn. The prisoner, held in Sante prison, confessed the slaying, but appeals had been made on grounds he was insane. President Doumer was shot fatally at a public gathering here last May.

GLASSFORD UNDER FIRE OVER B. E. F.

May Lose Job Because Of Defense Of Veterans In Washington

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Police Chief Pelham D. Glassford's defense of the bonus army threatened today to result in his dismissal or resignation after he denied Attorney General Mitchell's charges that the B. E. F. combined a dangerous number of communists and criminals. Glassford, whose tactics during the bonus occupation won him the support of many of the marchers, found himself embroiled in the sharpest controversy as a result of his denial that he had asked for federal troops after the Pennsylvania avenue riot on July 28.

The lanky police chief—former army officer with a hobby for painting—championed the bonus army and police policy during the occupation in his answer to Attorney General Mitchell's report made public by the president defending use of troops to evacuate the ex-servicemen.

The district of Columbia commissioners as well as the department of justice, followed up Glassford's statement denying he personally had asked for the aid of troops, by reiterating their assertions that he had. The statement of the commissioners said he "positively stated that the presence of troops was necessary."

Glassford asserted that when he met with the commissioners during a lull in the July 28 riot he recommended the aid of troops only if "further eviction is required."

The commissioner's will meet today to consider Glassford's statement. Attorney General Mitchell's report which defended the eviction on the grounds that serious disorders would have occurred otherwise due to the composition of the bonus army, was challenged by Glassford as containing assertions "contrary to facts" known to police.

Glassford denied that criminal and communist groups in the bonus army were a serious menace, as Mitchell had claimed. He also denied that the situation was beyond "unhampered" police control.

There were only 12 arrests of bonus marchers "for offenses of a criminal nature" in June and July, Glassford replied to Mitchell's charge that ranks of the bonus army were threatened with men with criminal records.

MAINE DEMOS SWEEP STATE IN BIG UPSET

Bourbons Elect Governor For First Time In Eighteen Years

BRANN BEATS MARTIN

Two Of Three Members Of Congress Also Named By Democrats

PORTLAND, ME., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Maine democrats elected a governor yesterday for the first time in 18 years. They also elected two of the state's delegation of three in the national house of representatives.

Louis J. Brown, democratic candidate for governor, had a lead of 1,387 over Burleigh Martin, republican, as but 18 of the state's 632 precincts were unreported.

Martin Declines Comment

Martin declined to comment "until complete returns were tabulated," while republican state chairman, Daniel F. Field, said the vote "in no way indicates the national sentiment of this state. It does indicate the result of local conflicts and local rivalries, a careful analysis of which warrants the conclusion that the state would have gone for Hoover at this time."

Democratic State Chairman John H. Dooley said the vote would insure "better government."

Brann, in a brief statement, said in the large vote—it was the greatest in the history of his party—"A renewed interest in government and public affairs."

The 18 districts missing in the second and third congressional districts where the democrats were ahead were so small they could not alter the final outcome of the unofficial tally.

JOSEPHUS DANIELS WON'T TALK HERE

The Lane county democratic central committee was notified Tuesday by state democratic leaders that Josephus Daniels will not be able to speak here Saturday as had been planned.

Daniels, former secretary of the navy, was to have spoken in behalf of the democratic platform at a rally in the armory. He has been called to California. Democratic leaders of Eugene plan to visit him at the train when he comes through Wednesday, at 11:40, and if there is a crowd at the depot he will be asked to speak.

Dan Poling, temperance leader, who was to have spoken Sunday probably will not be here at that time, as he has cancelled all speaking engagements to join the hunt for Col. Raymond Robins, missing day leader. Poling is now in Chicago and may leave for New York soon.

Amnesia Victim Is Believed War Vet

The Lane county health unit is caring for a man suffering with amnesia who is believed to be a war veteran who came to Oregon to attend the legion convention.

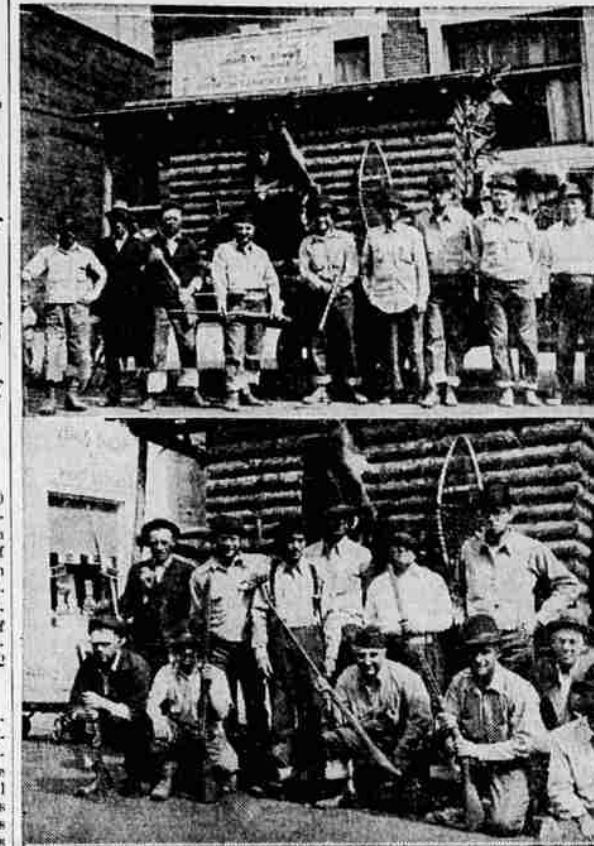

Hutchinsons Found Safe

ANGMAGSALIK, Greenland, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Wrecked on the beach less than 40 miles from here, George Hutchinson and the seven persons flying with him from New York to London were rescued today by the British trawler Lord Talbot.

A leaking gasoline tank forced them down in the water of Iterak fiord. The plane was wrecked on one of the reefs which make navigation of the little bay perilous.

Hutchinson, his wife, their two children and the crew of four men were ashore and reached the tiny Eskimo settlement of Eker, whose few inhabitants would have abandoned the place and returned to Angmagssalik for the winter in a few more weeks.

Youngster Runs Into Car, Hurt

Jack Hardcastle, four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Hardcastle, 1364 Lincoln, suffered a broken arm, cuts about the face and minor bruises when he ran in front of a car driven by Frank Fassett, 895 West Twelfth street.

Fassett, an instructor at Eugene high school, was driving on Lawrence street near Thirteenth and had slowed down to avoid endangering some children on the opposite side of the street, according to the report. The youngster had run from behind a parked car and was struck by Fassett's machine. He was taken to the Eugene hospital.

Attacks On Trains Renewed By Bandits

HARBIN, Manchuria, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Another outrage by bandits operating along the Chinese Eastern railway occurred last night at almost the same spot where the Harbin-Changchun was wrecked and plundered.

Nine Japanese soldiers were killed, twelve were seriously injured, a number of passengers were kidnapped, and the countryside reduced to a state of panic.

HURLEY IS BOOED BY AUDIENCE

Secretary Of War Leaves Ranks To Take Place With Reviewers

BONUS DEBATE DUE

Thousands Jam Streets To View Spectacle Of Marching Vets

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 13.—(AP)—A whooping secretary of war, unruffled by an echo of catcalls that penetrated the spontaneous outburst of applause which greeted him, led the cheering throngs in Multnomah stadium here today as the American Legion marched in their greatest peacetime demonstration.

Patrick J. Hurley, war secretary, whose visit to this annual convention of the legion has met with free and determined criticism as well as occasional thunderous ovations, whooped his famous Oklahoma war cry as the Oklahoma delegation passed through the stadium. In all sections of the great structure his piercing, happy shouts were heard.

B. E. F. Resolution May Lose

Then, heavily guarded by army, city police and secret service men, he left the stadium for the airport, to leave behind him the city and the convention which greeted him with varied moods.

This second day of the 14th annual convention presented quickly-changing, brilliantly hued, exciting and widely separated scenes.

Before the great lines of former soldiers formed at the stadium it was announced that immediate cash payment of the bonus would be recommended to the legislative committee of the convention tomorrow by the sub-committee of nine. The vote for such favorable recommendation was said committee members to be 5 to 4.

On the other hand a resolution which would have condemned President Hoover for eviction by armed troops of the bonus marchers from Washington, D. C., will be unfavorably reported.

Vote Is Avoided

Meanwhile, as the legion marched in its most splendid array, more than a dozen candidates for the post of national commander to succeed Henry L. Stevens, Jr., were actively engaged.

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FALL FESTIVAL IS TO BE BIG EVENT

The most unique fall festival ever planned for the people of the Eugene trading area has been worked out in detail by the directors of the merchants' division of the Eugene chamber of commerce, according to R. F. Callahan, president. A special committee headed by Arthur Quackenbush has been meeting for several weeks and complete details are expected to be ready for publication within a few days.

Over 175 merchants have agreed to participate in one of the largest selling events ever staged in Eugene. The affair will last two weeks and merchants are now arranging new merchandise which is arriving daily. Mr. Quackenbush states that the committee expects over 20,000 people to be in Eugene the last day, Saturday, Oct. 1, when a big surprise will be disclosed.

Opening ceremonies will be held in all the theaters of Eugene next Monday after, on and evening.
