YOUR CHILDREN

"Do you believe in strict, blind discipline for children?" "I don't. And I will tell you why. It is spiritual slavery."

"Train a little child to do our way without rhyme or reason, accept our word, obey! And you have a first class yes-man" all his life.

"What will be? A spineless dependent waiting to be told. Every act is done, every thought he thinks, will be controlled by someone else. If the world were carried out perfectly the world would be full of mentally paralyzed people."

"I have no use for that blundering parent who demands perfect obedience from a little child—discipline that makes no allowance for the totality of reasoning, his rights, or his privilege to be himself!"

"Oh, yes!" someone answered when I expressed these views one day. "And what would you have? A country full of harum-scarums and worse when they grew up. That is the trouble today. We have too many youngsters who don't know what obedience means."

"Yes, we have too many undisciplined people," I agreed. "In the really serious cases, I think you will find they have been disciplined too much, often to the point of abuse, when they were small. Disciplined before they could reason. That is the deadliest thing I know."

"What would you suggest as a substitute?" asked another mother. "Habit. A child will fall quite naturally into doing certain things at a certain time and do them naturally from some force within himself instead of the stronger, superimposed will and the bigger muscles of his parents."

"It is too idealistic for me," sighed a third. "That's all theory. Just try to practice it."

"Must Understand" "I have. And succeeded. One thing I learned in working with children is that you will get obedience in a certain thing just as soon as the child's mind is old enough to grasp the reasonableness of it. We insist on orders to satisfy our own selfishness very often."

"Then you don't believe in unquestioning obedience?" "Certainly I do, but only in about six things. The scale can widen somewhat each year as the child grows. But I have discovered this. The reasonable understanding parent who tries to develop the child and his or her own selfishness in the way of discipline. And their children are independent, forthright, honest, and capable children."

TODAY'S RECIPES By SISTER MARY

IT'S easy to plan September meals if you use originality and imagination. Vegetables and fruits are abundant and they all tempt us by their own perfection. Vegetable cookery should continue to be stressed throughout September. Frequently a well-planned vegetable combination, containing a small amount of meat or fish, will serve acceptably as a main dish for luncheon or supper.

Veal cutlets with stuffed sweet peppers is a splendid dish for a September dinner. Serve it with a tomato and cucumber salad and a fresh dessert.

Cutlets With Stuffed Peppers

Four veal cutlets, 1 egg, cracker crumbs, 2 large sweet green peppers, 1-2 cup diced green beans (cooked), 4 tablespoons tiny cooked onions, 1-2 cup diced meat (cooked), 1-2 cup diced cooked beets, 4 tablespoons Hollandaise sauce or melted butter.

Steak can be used and cut in neat pieces, each one large enough for a serving, or "cutlets" can be used. Trim meat and roll in crumbs. Dip in egg slightly beaten with 1 tablespoon cold water and roll again in crumbs. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and saute a rich brown on both sides. Reduce heat and cook slowly for 30 minutes. Place on a hot platter and on each cutlet put half a pepper filled with combination of vegetables.

Four the sauce or melted butter over each stuffed pepper, and serve at once. After cutting peppers in halves and removing seeds, simmer for eight minutes in boiling salted water. Drain and fill with any combination of vegetables at hand. This is an

excellent way to use left-over vegetables.
