

# Marion Hall, New Coach, Opens Football Practice At Springfield High

## THIRTEEN PLAYERS ANSWER CALL MAY BE LUCKY NUMBER

Springfield high school, always a formidable contestant in "A" league play opened its first practice Monday with 13 players on hand. The smallest opening turnout in many years may be swelled to twice that number when all of the students have answered the call, however.

Marion Hall, ex-University of Oregon football star, is football coach at Springfield this year, having succeeded Normal May, who resigned last spring.

Hall will have to rebuild the team this year, several of his lettermen having graduated. Those who will not



return include Loyd Freese, halfback; George Thatcher, quarter; Vernon Liles, fullback; Gordon Wright, end; H. Stevenson, end; Orval Stevenson, guard; and Bill Sward, tackle. Dick Wright, a substitute end last year, has moved to Eugene and is turning out with the Purple squad.

Harold Rasmussen, a guard, will probably not return to school this year.

### They're Tough 13

On the credit side of the ledger, however, Hall finds 13 willing youngsters. They include Anderson, Thurman, Chetwood, Wilson, Stewart, Hawk, Fox, Cole, Tuby, Smith, Nelson, Glen Rasmussen and Williams.

They may prove an unlucky thirteen for the teams Springfield will meet this year. Hall expects numerous other players out before the end of the week and regular afternoon workouts have been called. A number of big, inexperienced men may be on hand to be whipped into gridiron material.

Bruce Squires, the little halfback who made such a hit in the Eugene-Springfield game here last year, will be back at Springfield in a day or so. Jimmy West and S. Randall of last year's team, Verne Allen, and several others, will be out soon.

## KENTUCKY BOY IS FIRST DAY'S HERO IN AMATEUR MEET

BALTIMORE COUNTRY CLUB, Md., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Today's hero of the U. S. amateur golf championship was long lean Johnny Fischer, of Fort Thomas, Ky. This 150-lb. footer who holds American intercollegiate championship set out with 150 others to complete the qualifying rounds of the 1932 national tournament. His score of 69 for the first qualification round was just three strokes better than those of his nearest rivals, and only a golfing miracle in reverse could keep him from rating a place in Black Wednesday's "sudden death" man-to-man limit contest.

Today's second and final qualification round found many of the pre-tournament favorites already on the outside looking in at the boys who will rate places in match play. Francis Ouimet of Brookline, Mass., defending champion, could do no better than 78 in his first tour.

### Others On Line

Others of Ouimet's "border line" class included Tony Torrance of England, with 80; Eric McTurvie, who like Torrance was a member of the British Walker cup team with 79; John De Forest, British amateur champion, 78; Don Moe, Portland, 80; Rex Hartley, England, 81.

Along with Fischer, the leaders as the second qualification round started today were Jack Westland, of Chicago, 71, and Charley Yates, Georgia Tech sophomore; Johnny Goodman, of Omaha; George Voigt, of New York; W. O. Blinney, of West Newton, Mass., and D. L. Armstrong, of Lancaster, Pa., each of whom had a 72.

Chandler Egan, of Medford, Ore., became one of the sentimental favorites by scoring a 73 in his first test. Egan won the title in 1904 and repeated in 1905.

Today's play will be made up of the second qualifying round of 18 holes. Tomorrow two rounds of match play at 18 holes will reduce the 32 qualifiers to a final of eight which will begin 36 hole match rounds Thursday.

Fritz Kramer, Eugene high school football coach, returned from Portland Monday with the report that Jefferson high school is going to be mighty tough to beat. Kramer's outfit will tangle with the state championship Jefferson team Saturday evening in Multnomah Stadium. The game will be played under the lights.

The Eugene outfit spent the week-end in Portland completing arrangements for the game and, incidentally, looking over Jefferson's squad in practice. He reports the Jefferson outfit a big, heavy, seasoned team and Kramer's face wore a solemn look as he ordered his men to scrimmage Monday afternoon.

The Eugene outfit received the news with no signs of fear, however, and tore into the scrimmage with renewed vigor. Though Jefferson lost six men by graduation, one of them being the redoubtable Bobby Grayson, they still have lettermen for every position and husky reserves to fill in.

Eugene high, on the other hand, will be lighter this year than last. If fire and enthusiasm can win half games, Eugene still stands a chance against Jefferson. Most of the men are green but man for man they'll battle the seasoned Jeffersonians to a stand-still.

Fritz Kramer hasn't definitely selected a first team yet and will wait until the last minute to announce his starting lineup.

Monday was the first day of school and a number of men reported. Some of them are lettermen from other schools but as none knew the Eugene plays, they couldn't show much the first day. Kramer hopes, however, that the squad will be strengthened by the new material.

Joe Hill, Eugene end, is off his crutches and is hobbling around. He may be able to tape his injured leg enough to see some action in Portland. Dean Knight, center, is being groomed for the end position as Kramer fears Hill will get to play very little. John Hill, fiery captain, has been shifted to the other end and will play opposite his twin brother. This leaves the center position open and Sid Milligan has been shifted from end to center. Though he lacks seasoning at that job, he has been showing up well.

One of the highlights of Monday's practice was the appearance of Dick Reff, who saw action as center on the heavy Roseburg team last year. He is a big man with plenty of fight and may be used at center with Milligan moved over in the line. Red Anderson, who has been playing center on the second string, is also showing promise.

Marlin Mann, husky youngster, has been starring on defense at tackle and has been drawing a lot of attention. He is still green and will need seasoning but from present indications, will be a bear on defense.

Carson and Reed, two tackles from last year, have been split and Reed has been shifted to guard as a running mate to Roy Northum. The guards are doing much of the blocking this year and these two make up a pair of hard hitting blocking guards.

Wayne Warner, youngster from Roseburg, has been showing up well at guard and Barker, another guard, has been looking nice. Brownfield and Bud Barnes, two other guards, are giving the regulars a run for their money. Paul Agater, last year's tackle, is back for his old job. ## YANKS LACK ONE GAME OF TAKING AMERICAN TITLE

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The New York Yankees need only a victory today over the Cleveland Indians to clinch the American league pennant, while the Chicago Cubs require 10 wins out of 14 remaining games to assure the National circuit flag.

Joe McCarthy's Yankees can lose 11 of their 12 remaining contests while the runner-up Philadelphia Athletics take all of their 12 and the Washington Senators sweep their 14 and still the New Yorkers will triumph.

In the National league, however, the second-place Pirates have 14 games left and the Dodgers 12.

The Yanks assured themselves of at least a tie yesterday by defeating the Cleveland Indians, 8 to 3, in 12 innings, maintaining their 12 game lead over the Athletics.

Meanwhile Connie Mack's Athletics and Walter Johnson's Senators continued their battle for second place. Lefty Grove turned in his 25th mound victory of the season in giving the A's a 7 to 1 win over the Detroit Tigers, and Washington defeated the Chicago White Sox, 9 to 3, behind Albin Crowder's 9-hit pitching.

Boston at St. Louis was played in a double-header Sunday.

Scoring three runs in the first inning, the Pittsburgh Pirates got off to an early lead and were never headed as they downed the Phillies, 4 to 2, advancing within five games of the Chicago Cubs, leaders of the National league, who lost to Brooklyn, 4 to 3.
