General trading in the egg market appears of strong character despite the offering of considerable under-grade stuff to large consumers by outsiders.

Real strength appears in the market for live chickens according to local produce companies. There is an especially strong tone in the springer market but all prices are firm at full figures generally.

Rather limited call is reflected for live broiler turkeys in the local trade with the best offerings moving slowly around 17-18c. Dressed old stock is unchanged at late figures.

Offerings of peas out of the Brownseed section are not of sufficient volume to take care of trade wants inasmuch as practically all other sections are sending very inferior stock. Brownseed peas mostly 6c lb.

Trade in peaches is very disappointing according to local distributors. Even the record low values recently in effect here have failed to stimulate demand to the point where cleanups are shown daily.

Recent extremes of \$1.25 crate for Dillard cantaloupes of the better grade is being maintained. In fact other cantaloupes are firmer.

Crab salmon remains at low price. Coast re-meat Chink is selling at \$2.00 a bushel. While a similar price is shown for steelhead and silver salmon. Crabs are practically off the market.

The extreme shortage of quality country killed calves has forced the top price to a dime a pound. Hogs and lambs are unchanged generally.

Potatoes still firmer up in the Yuma section.

Onions are about steady for Oregon with Walla Walla stock being shaded here to clean up.

Tomatoes are still held at the low point with heavy supplies.

Grapes are very low sale for all varieties.

Household mushrooms are appearing again. Mostly 50c lb.

NEW PRODUCTS ARE SEEN AT MARKET

New produce in the Producers' Public market Tuesday were grapes, which were selling at 15 cents a bushel, and cauliflower, selling at 5 to 10 cents a pound. Peaches are getting lower as the arrivals increase, the price being marked Tuesday at 45 cents a bushel.

Cantaloupes are looking fine and they are very cheap at the present time. The lack of rain has caused them to ripen rapidly. Tomatoes are also benefited by the continued warm and dry weather and they are of the very best quality at present. There is still a plentiful supply of sweet corn in the market and string beans are still coming in. A fine lot of plums were seen in several stalls and peaches are of the later varieties are being sold. Peas are cheap and plentiful.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—Butter trade conditions continue to reflect steadiness in the local territory. Decrease in the output of entire country is generally noted with an especially liberal loss reflected in churning throughout the Pacific northwest. This is a reasonable condition and is due to the protracted dry weather.

Prices were unchanged for cubes during the late session of the produce exchange and on the open market a similar condition was reflected. Demand, however, continues best for those offerings below extra grade.

EARLY WASHOUT IS NULLIFIED; MARKET SWINGS UP AGAIN

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—A deep washout in the stock market was quickly repaired by a heavy volume of buying and short covering late today.

Early losses of \$2 to more than \$10 a share, representing the steepest break of the year, were reduced or eliminated during the afternoon as the market swung upward almost as swiftly as it had descended. Trading was in huge volume and turnover exceeded 5,000,000 shares.

The market, after a precipitate first-hour plunge under the impact of heavy offerings, met support by noon. It wavered a little, but finally struck a stronger stride and became very active on the upturn. The final tone was heavy.

Just before the close leading stocks dipped from their highs of the rally and net losses of \$1 to \$3 were rather general.

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MANY UNEMPLOYED ARE REGISTERED

Two hundred and twenty-eight unemployed persons have registered at the city recorder's office, according to the report made at the city council Monday evening by R. S. Bryson.

Though the city offers no relief employment at the present time, the list of unemployed will be turned over to the county and those registered will be given consideration with county relief work.

The classifications of those listed follow:

Laborers 40, carpenters 37, truckers and teamsters 21, lumber and millmen 10, railroadmen 15, mechanics 14, painters 1, clerical 1, loggers 8, salesmen 6, teachers 5, janitors 5, electricians 4, farmers 4, construction 2, photographers 2.

One each: Singer, tinner, roofer, telegrapher, accountant, barber, blacksmith, bootblack, creameryman, draftsman, fitter, gardener, handyman, hod carrier, lather, meat cutter, plasterer, plumber, printer, sculptor, service station, shingler, waiter.

Of the above: married, 208; single, 50. Property owners, 69; ex-service men, 13; other members of family employed, 32.

The period of residence of registrants runs from two months to 72 years, with the average residence 10.72 years. Twenty-two registrants have lived in the city less than one year.

The unemployment period runs from a few days to four years, with the average period of unemployment, 7.04 months.

Of the 288 persons registered, 215 have dependents totaling 613 or an average of 2.85 dependents for each of them. The remaining 73 unemployed show no dependents.

About two-thirds of all registrants are renters and for the most part those owning property hold it subject to mortgage. Practically all registrants are bona-fide residents of Eugene and but very few of the entire number can possibly be classified as transients.

Two families have 11 dependents and one family has ten dependents.

Ferry Death Toll Advances to 56

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—Ten bodies came to the surface of the East river today near where the labor ferry Observation sank Friday morning after her boiler exploded. These brought the total of known dead in the disaster to 56.

Of the original list of those believed to have been on the boat and reported missing, nine remained unaccounted for today. Twenty-eight injured were still in hospitals.

Students Give Farm Produce As Tuition

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—Potatoes, apples, sorghum, grapes and other farm products were being received today at Drury college as tuition.

Many students can supply such products, but haven't cash, college officials said.

MEDFORD, Ore., Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—State police and the sheriff's office today sought a man, who late yesterday seized and assaulted a nine-year old Phoenix school girl, as she was walking home from school down the railroad track.

The assailant is described as 45 years old and heavily bearded.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(U.P.)—Business failures in the United States in the past week showed the fifth successive drop, totaling only 420, against 540 in the preceding week, Dun's reported.

CHICAGO.—A steady and marked improvement in business of Marshall Field and company is taking place, John McKinlay, president of the company, said.

BOSTON.—Retail stores in the Boston area will buy \$60,700,000 worth of merchandise between Sept. 1 and Dec. 31, according to C. P. Bennett, chairman of the banking and industrial committee of the Boston district.

NEW YORK.—Kleinert Rubber company recalled 800 former employees and resumed work on a full five-day week schedule to meet a big increase in orders.

CHICAGO.—United Airlines reported passenger business in August of this year exceeded that of 1931 by 89 per cent. The transport system carried 11,888 revenue passengers in the period, it reported and approximately 128 tons of air mail.

KANSAS CITY, Kan.—Twenty-five men went to work today at the refining plant of the Sinclair Oil company, which had been shut down for 10 months. Additional workers are expected to be employed immediately.
