

EVENING CLASSES FOR CREDIT WILL BE HELD AT "U"

Evening classes in a variety of subjects for men and women who enjoy systematic study, and for those who wish to earn college credit as well will be held on the university campus again this year, starting Monday, October 3, it is announced by Miss Mabelle Hair, of the extension division.

Classes will be held once each week in history, English drama, and sociology, and each will be taught by outstanding faculty members. Each will carry two-term hours credit, although the purpose will be more to interest those who wish to engage in intellectual pursuits. Plenty of opportunity for discussion will be allowed those taking the courses.

Registration for the classes will take place during the week of September 26 to October 1, and full information on procedure may be obtained by calling 3300, local 326, Miss Hair says. The evening for the meeting of the different classes will be announced as soon as enrollment is completed.

The course in history will be on China and Japan, and will deal with the Far East in modern times. It will be concerned with the cultural and political history of the countries bordering on the Asiatic shores of the Pacific. The first term will lay more emphasis on cultural and social organization and the developments of such countries as China and Japan, and the second term will emphasize their international relationships. Dr. Harold J. Noble, assistant professor of history and an authority on the history of the Orient, will be in charge of the course.

A course of special interest will be that in English drama, to be taught by Robert D. Horn, assistant professor of English. This will include the study of leading dramatic traditions and influences in England, America, and the leading Continental centers. Dr. Samuel Haig Jameson will have charge of the class in sociology, which will be called "Social Interaction." The course will endeavor to clarify the point as to how our "nature" become modified through the contacts we make with other persons and groups, directly or indirectly, consciously or unconsciously. Dr. Jameson says in describing the work to be taken up, "and how it happens that we get our social and anti-social fixations and how society makes the desperate attempt to control the processes."

Since the classes must be entirely self-supporting, it is urged that persons interested register as soon as possible during registration week.

EUGENE MAY LOSE NEW POSTOFFICE

Government officials in Washington announced Friday that the proposed postoffice project for Eugene has been eliminated from the relief building program, but chamber of commerce officials, working through the Oregon congressional delegation, are still working to get the building.

Eugene had been listed for a \$200,000 building. Eugene had tried to raise the allotment to \$500,000, stating that increase of government business made expansion necessary.

Officials at Washington said that a number of the proposed projects have been cut off the list in cases where they held the need for new buildings was not pressing. Grants Pass was reported to have been eliminated also.

stimulate farm buying in this part of the state.

The manner of selecting those to whom farms will be given free will be to announce that applications will be received and the farms given to the first 20 in the order their applications are received, provided they are bona fide farmers and have the necessary cash to begin farming with.

Must Have Money

There are just two conditions that must be met by prospective settlers to obtain these farms, it was explained. They must be practical farmers and each must have \$3000 in cash. Mr. Harlan said that the chamber of commerce is not encouraging anyone to settle in Lane county unless he has enough money with which to establish himself in the community.

Mr. Harlan announced that the Eugene realty board has promised its hearty co-operation in this land settlement plan and that the program will be launched as soon as possible. A committee consisting of W. K. Barnard of Springfield, Sam Lehman of Junction City and Frank Mendenhall of Cottage Grove was appointed to represent the county chamber of commerce in furthering the campaign.

Keeney Gives Figures

It was after Ben F. Keeney, county assessor, gave figures and figures as to the effect on taxes on property in Lane county when the moving of the University of Oregon would have that the chamber voted unanimously against the Zorn-Macpherson moving bill. Mr. Keeney stated that it is a conservative estimate that there would result a depreciation of ten per cent of the assessed valuation of property in Lane county, outside of Eugene, through its removal from the tax roll and that Eugene's depreciation in like manner with that of the outside portion of the county can safely be estimated at 33 1/3 per cent from the roll. Therefore it follows, he pointed out that there must result a most substantial increase in taxation, coupled with a lessening of advantages for earning tax money.

The increase by this, in his estimation, is shown as follows: For state and county purposes all property of the county would be subject to an increase in taxes of \$4.50 on each \$1000 assessed valuation over that of 1931. The increase for school district No. 4 (Eugene) would be \$7.30 per each \$1000 assessed valuation while in like manner the increase in Eugene's city tax would be \$8.80 per \$1000 assessed valuation, the whole representing a total increase of \$20.60 on each \$1000 assessed valuation in the city of Eugene.

R. C. Kuehner, county club leader, spoke of the increase in the number of members of the Four-H club boys and girls in the county, stating that the number is now approximately

2500, having increased from 1900 last year, and that 3500 different projects are being carried.

Relief Work Explained
O. E. Crowe, county commissioner, stated that relief gardens were planted in 32 different communities of the county this year and that the county canneries that goes from community to community to can fruits and vegetables for the needy families has had an output of 24,000 cans up to the present time and is still "going strong." The county gets one can out of every six as a reserve stock for the needy. The county has also given out 18,204 jars to those who cannot afford to buy them, making a total of over 42,000 jars of produce that have been canned. He also announced that the Eugene Fruit Growers' association is drying a lot of prunes for relief purposes and the work is being done free.

Plans for the Chehalis road relocation were announced by N. O. Isaacson of Goldsboro. A caravan will be formed on the Pacific road a mile and a half south of Junction City, proceed over the new road to Chehalis and Blachly where brief stops will be made, then proceed to Tri-angle lake where the exercises will be held.

County Judge C. P. Barnard gave a resume of highway plans for the future, stating that the contractor is on the ground for the surfacing of the several miles of the Willamette highway west of Gresham and that word has been received by the county court that the federal bureau of public roads is going ahead with the extension of the same highway over the summit of the Cascades.

Plans for the observance of Lane county day at the state fair were discussed. Monday, Sept. 26, the first day of the fair, has been designated as the day.

Mr. Isaacson made a brief speech of welcome at the opening of the meeting and W. K. Barnard of Springfield responded.

A chicken dinner was served by the women of the Low Pass community club and a short program was given of piano numbers by Ted Charles and tap dancing by Hal Hutton.

Cottage Grove was voted as the next meeting place of the chamber.

This saved him another half and on the 18th he got down an eight footer to stay even.
