

GERMANY TO PASS ANNUAL PAYMENT ON DEBT TO U. S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(U.P.)—Germany has agreed to pass the annual payment of \$100,000,000 on its debt to the United States.

Secretary of Treasury Mellon announced yesterday that he had agreed to let Germany wait until 1934 to pay \$7,800,000 due tomorrow on account of war claims and cost of the American army of occupation.

90 Day Notice Waived
Mellon waived the requirement in the German-American debt settlement of 1930 that Germany must give 90 days notice of intention to postpone payments. He explained that he had promised Ambassador von Prittwitz last June 30 that if Germany did not then file a claim for postponement, but wanted to see whether it could pay, he would not invoke the 90 day notice clause.

Three other nations—Estonia, Latvia and Poland—were notified the treasury before Sept. 15 that they could not pay \$90,000, \$87,000, and \$1,125,000 respectively, when these payments fall due Dec. 15.

Thus, including the German payments, arrangements have been made by four nations to postpone \$9,032,000 out of total debt installments of approximately \$181,000,000 falling due in December.

Britain Expects to Pay
Official interest is centering on whether the major debtors, Great Britain, France and Italy, owing nearly nine-tenths of the total American credits, will pay their December semi-annual debt installments. None gave notice of postponement before Sept. 15. Yet they, like Germany, could ask Mellon to waive the 90 days notice requirement if, as now seems likely, no permanent readjustment of debts is made by congress before Dec. 15.

Officials think it unlikely that Britain owing about \$80,000,000 will ask to postpone payment. True, the British treasury is hard pressed. But, observers believe, the world's great creditor nation cannot afford to set a bad example for its own debtors.

France Able, But—
The policy of France, owing \$25,000,000 in December is uncertain. Paris officials believe, can pay. It has the second largest gold stock in the world. But France recently co-operated in shoving down German reparations to the vanishing point. And as the French foreign office always has held that reparations and war debts were linked, observers here believe that a French government which paid the United States after failing to collect from Germany would be castigated by the French people.

Italy, owing around \$7,000,000 in December is understood to be in dire financial straits. Both its ability and willingness to pay are uncertain.

No Mail Delivered Thursday Afternoon

Mail deliveries in the residential section of the city will not be made on Thursday afternoons hereafter, D. E. Yoran, postmaster, announced Thursday. The cut of one afternoon a week is made in accordance with a new regulation effected by the post office department which will save money by giving employees 24 days a year off without pay.

Another new ruling provides that persons having permits to mail at reduced rate without stamps will lose the privilege if it is unused for a period of a year. Renewals cost \$10.

filtration plant; Walter Moore, residing in an extensive program, and Byron Taylor, supervising engineer.

Retirement of debt, low rates and high standard of service will be the policy of the McArthur administration. With an evaluation of four and a quarter millions, the electrical department of the water board utilities now has in outstanding debt \$1,280,000, he pointed out. This means that the water board has earned approximately three million dollars on which the city now benefits by not having to bear interest charges. At present, there is in the sinking fund \$144,000 for the retirement of debt.

Mr. McArthur was first associated with the water board during the start of the Walthersville power plant when he was in charge of the survey for that plant in 1908. From 1910 to 1912 he was city engineer at Lebanon and in 1913 he was elected a member of the Eugene water board from the first ward, serving two terms. During that time he was county bridge engineer and in 1923 he came to the water board as supervising engineer. He received his B. S. degree from the University of Oregon in 1908 and the C. E. degree in civil engineering in 1912. In 1910 and 1917 he went to Cornell on a scholarship and received his masters degree in civil engineering in 1917.
