FRIENDS OF U. RENEW PLEDGE TO FIGHT BILL

Donors To Original Fund Speak At Dedication Of Little Deady

PIONEERS PLAY PART

Speakers Say Sacrifices Of Pioneers Must Be Respected

Friends of higher education renewed their pledge to the pioneers of Lane county to keep the University of Oregon in Eugene at the dedication of "Little Deady Hall" Saturday.

Pioneers who made deep sacrifices to raise the money and donate the land through which Old Deady hall, the first building of the university, was built, thereby giving to people of the state an institution for the education of their children, were remembered by speakers who attended the university spoke... the wife of one of the first regents of the school... people who have seen the school grow these 56 years joined with younger friends of the school in dedicating the university remain.

BILL BORN IN INEQUITY

Max Anne Whiteaker, daughter of the first governor of Oregon, sounded the keynote for the pioneers in opening the meeting. "We must keep up the fight for our school," she said. "The Zane-McPherson bill, conceived in inequity, born in sin without legal advantage, must be defeated. The university shall stand."

James W. Mott, alumnus of the university who is now a candidate for congress and who has been active in the fight to retain the university, declared that conclusive are the arguments that the school grab bill must be defeated, the spiritual side of the fight will win the victory alone for the university.

These Lane county pioneers gave the people of the state their university when they sacrificed 56 years ago to build the school," he said. "At that time the people of the state agreed to keep the university here. The people of the state have not forgotten what the pioneers of this county did for them, and will pledge themselves anew in November by defeating this bill."

TWELVE DROWNED IN BIG CLOUDBURST

Forty Foot Wall of Water Spreads Destruction Through Canyon

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Twelve persons were known to be dead and possibly a score of others may have been drowned in a terrific cloudburst in the mountains Tehachapi region some fifty miles south-east of here last night.

WIRE COMMUNICATION WITH TEHACHAPI WAS CUT OFF AND NO DEFINITE INFORMATION WAS AVAILABLE AS TO THE ACTUAL TOTAL NUMBER OF VICTIMS.

A wall of water forty feet high swept down the narrow canyon of Tehachapi pass, demolishing the Southern Pacific station, a gasoline service station, causing a freight train locomotive and seven cars to plunge into a canyon at Woodford, and tearing out long sections of the rail lines and highways.

The torrent struck a Southern Pacific freight car at Woodford, 40 miles south of Bakersfield, hurling a locomotive and seven freight cars into a canyon and killing the engineer, A. H. Ross of Bakersfield.

Mr. and Mrs. Peter Kadd and their two children perished when the water wall struck their gasoline service station there and carried it away. It was believed several others were in the station at the time and also were swept into the flood.

In addition to these fatalities the bodies of two unidentified persons had been recovered today.

The train carried an undetermined number of itinerants and authorities believed many had been swept away and buried under the debris in the wake of the torrent.

Barn and Chicken House Burn Down

The barn and chicken house on the Taylor place on Hansen lane were burned in an early morning fire Saturday.

The fire department answered the call at 6:15 a. m., finding the buildings in a blaze when they arrived. Origin of the fire was not known, but neighbors told firemen they first saw the blaze in the hayrack of the barn. Extent of the damage was not determined.

50,000 ATTEND GAME

Chicago Errors Pave Way For New York Victory; Play Exciting

By GEORGE KIRKSEY (United Press Staff Correspondent) Wrigley Field, Chicago, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Home runs by Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig enabled the New York Yankees to win their third straight game from the Chicago Cubs today, 7 to 5.

Ruth and Gehrig hit two homers apiece, and between them drove in six of the Yankees seven runs.

A crowd of 51,000 saw the Cubs battle futilely to halt the victorious march of the American league champions.

The Yankees now need only one more game to win their third straight world title without losing a game.

Pennock Saves Day The victory came only after Manager Joe McCarthy had called on his veteran southpaw, Herb Pennock who stopped a building Chicago rally in the ninth after Hartnett had smashed out a home run and young Jurgas had lined a single into left field.

Pennock easily disposed of the next three batters in order.

A crack in the Cubs defense paved the way for the opening trio of Yankees runs in the first, when Jurgas, with plenty of time to spare, threw Combs' grounder into the Yankee dugout. 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DETECTIVE ON WAY TO QUIZ CALLICOTTE

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP)—A San Francisco detective is enroute to Portland to interrogate Paul M. Callicotte, eccentric mountaineer, who has "confessed" that he planted the San Francisco Preparedness day bomb, police say today.

Captain of Detectives Harvey A. Thatcher received a telegram from Chief of Police William J. Quinn of San Francisco, saying a detective is on his way.

Meanwhile Callicotte remains a voluntary prisoner, held in detention in the police emergency hospital.

Since his confession Tuesday night Callicotte has stuck steadfastly to his story and police have been unable to trip him on any of the details. They are, nevertheless, quite skeptical of the veracity of his story, because of his known eccentricity and flair for publicity.

Arrests Near In Proebstel Slaying Case

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 1.—(AP)—With authorities of three states maintaining a diligent watch, an "important" arrest in the Proebstel ambush slaying of a prohibition agent was expected shortly, Sheriff McCrite of Clark county said today.

Meanwhile, no trace of Jesse Cousins, alleged to have fired the shots which resulted in the death of Ballard Turner, prohibition agent, had developed. Search continued in the hills north of Proebstel and in Portland.

The condition of Edward B. Vlasich, dry agent wounded in the ambush, was declared "satisfactory" today and his recovery is assured. He told authorities that Louis Cousins, brother of the sought suspect, was not the man who shot him three times. Louis was arrested at the scene of the shooting and is being held in the Clark county jail.

Turner's body was to be returned to Seattle today for burial.

STEIWER PRAISES PROGRAM OF G. O. P.

Young Republicans Hosts To Senator And Mott At Luncheon

The republican campaign was spurred on Saturday noon by more than 100 members of the party who were guests of the Young Republican club at one of the liveliest meetings yet to be held here by a political party.

Senator Frederick W. Steiwer and James W. Mott, candidate for congress, spoke on the issues of the campaign. Pioneers of the county, who numbered several prominent democrats as well as many republicans, were guests of the Young Republicans following the dedication of "Little Deady Hall. All the republican candidates for county offices were introduced.

The republican administration has applied itself to the great task of economic recovery with vigor, and we may well be proud of the program that is being carried forward," he said. "The great financial leaders whom we looked to for the way out of the depression have failed, and to the rank and file of the people of the nation will go the credit of accomplishing recovery."

The senator pointed out that during the world crisis America has stood alone as the only nation whose people have maintained all their rights—Americans are better off than any other people and by their faith in their government are pointing the way to recovery and perpetuation of the nation.

James W. Mott told the Young Republicans that it is not enough to simply go to the polls and vote a straight ticket. He urged them to campaign actively and compare each republican candidate with his opponent, citing the reasons why G. O. P. men should be returned to office. He declared the chief issue on the election is the retention of a government system which acts for the people.

Three troops of the Illinois national guard, comprising about 250 men, were ordered mobilized at Peoria.

As the troops marched into the army, their officers said they expected orders momentarily to proceed to Canton.

LUMBERMEN SEEK RATE REDUCTIONS

Coast Men Seek Chance To Compete For Trade In Midwest Section

Reduction of railroad freight rates on lumber was urged by 50 lumbermen who gathered in Eugene Friday night as the solution to both the marketing problem of lumbermen and the tonnage problem faced by the railroads.

The lumbermen want rates reduced on northwest lumber moving into the Mississippi valley in order to compete by rail with southern timber and substitutes for lumber. At present they are shipping by water through the Panama canal because they cannot afford to pay the railroad rate. During their discussion they pointed out that reduction of freight rates would be of mutual benefit to themselves and the railroads, guaranteeing them an inlet into midwest territory at an expense which will enable them to compete with other regions and guaranteeing the railroads much tonnage which now goes to water shipping.

H. N. Proebstel of Seattle, traffic manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, outlined to valley lumbermen the campaign carried on by the W. C. L. A. and other groups to obtain a reduction in rates.

J. B. Fitzgerald, public relations director of the W. C. L. A., spoke on the part lumber plays in the manufacturing of the state and urged that lumbermen acquaint the people of the state with their fight for lower rates.

W. C. McCulloch, Portland attorney, who has represented the lumbermen in their campaigns, recounted the history of the battle and urged lumbermen to back their associations in their representations to the railroads.

T. O. Russell, ex-president of the Eugene chamber of commerce, spoke also. The meeting was presided over by J. S. Magdaly, president of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, which sponsored the meeting.

A feature of the program Saturday evening will be the presentation of Abbie Green's orchestra, which will play from 6:30 till 7. Street dancing will be held and singing and dancing numbers are scheduled.

This program winds up the two weeks festival during which 210 Eugene merchants have participated in the event rather than dressing up their windows for the usual fall opening and style show. Merchants believed that by giving two weeks to the occasion, more people of the trade area would have opportunity to visit the stores and to receive personal attention.

Indications were that 20,000 persons at least would attend the program Saturday night and a system of loud speakers has been established so that all may hear.

Fire Prevention Week Proclaimed

MILK WAR AVERTED FOR EUGENE AREA



Rumors of Price-Cutting are Squashed at Meeting; Prices Listed

Threat of a milk war in Eugene was averted Saturday morning at a hurriedly called meeting of distributors, producers, raw milk people and business men.

Rumors of a price-cutting war were settled when agreement was made by the group on the following prices: Grade A raw milk, pasteurized, 10 cents a quart.

Grade A pasteurized milk, 9 cents a quart.

Raw milk, 8 cents a quart.

The only difference in prices that have prevailed is in the one-cent differential between grade A pasteurized and grade A pasteurized milk.

The meeting was held at the chamber of commerce. Representatives were present for the four distributing plants in the city, Eugene Farmers' creamery, Medo-Land creamery, Reid's creamery, and the plant of the Milk Producers' association which opened for business Saturday, as well as from business firms anxious to ward off milk scraps and other groups.

Former Mayor Walker Leaves For Madrid

GIBRALTAR, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Former mayor, James J. The mayor had been one of the passengers aboard the new Italian liner Rex, which was delayed here two days on its maiden voyage to New York. Shortly after noon it was still uncertain when the ship's damaged turbines would be repaired and it would be able to continue the voyage. Passengers were showing increased discontent.
