 Rev. Harry N. Mount, an esteemed pastor for eight years at the First Presbyterian church, now Central Presbyterian church of Eugene, died in Stanford, Ill., on Sunday, Sept. 25.

Rev. Mr. Mount is survived by his widow, a daughter, Mrs. Frances Macky of Chicago, three sons, Ralph Mount of Bridgeport, Conn., Robert and James Mount of Portland, Ore.

Funeral services were held in Stanford, Ill., where he had preached for several years, and in Crawfordville, Indiana, his old home.

William H. Block
 William H. Block, 292 Twelfth avenue west, died Saturday morning at the Eugene hospital at the age of 74 years.

He was born in Monroe, Wis., May 19, 1858, and was of German descent. He moved to Iowa where he grew to manhood and later homesteaded in Nebraska. In 1881 he married Sarah L. Barnes of Oakdale, Neb.

Mr. Block was prominent in public life in Antelope county, Neb., having served as county commissioner, county school superintendent, and county clerk for two terms in each office. He lived in that state for 30 years, moving later to Centerville, Washington, and to Eugene in 1910.

Mr. Block is survived by his widow, Mrs. Sarah Block, a son, Ray Block of Norbury, Sask., Can.; and two daughters, Mrs. J. H. Stanley and Miss Daisy Block, both of Eugene; five grandchildren. Mr. Block was the last of his family.

The funeral services are to be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Pool-Gray-Bartholomew chapel, Rev. Cecil F. Ristow officiating. Interment will be in Rest Haven memorial park.
