

CHRISTIAN IDEAL AND REPUBLICANS SUBJECT OF PASTOR

"The Republican Party and the Christian Ideal" was discussed by Rev. Cecil F. Ristow, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, at the co-operative services put on Sunday evening at Central Presbyterian church by the Methodist Episcopal, Congregational, and Central Presbyterian churches.

"Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever" is a statement which emphasizes a great truth; society, and social problems, however, are not the same yesterday, today, and forever; new occasions teach new duties; and one of today's new duties is the duty of citizenship in a democracy, therefore the subject of this series," Rev. Mr. Ristow said.

His talk in part follows:

"The Christian Ideal by which I propose to measure the republican party and platform is perhaps best summed up in the words of Jesus: 'What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?' and 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.' In a word, human welfare in terms of the abundant life for everyone is the Christian Ideal.

"Suppose we measure some principles of the republican platform by that standard.

"The republican party has always been the staunch supporter of the American system of a protective tariff... adequate tariff protection is today particularly essential to the welfare of the American people," he quoted. "Probably a tariff for protection is an economic fallacy, although I am not an economist. Certainly a tariff for protection is un-Christian in that it places first importance upon selfish interests. From the Christian point of view, the welfare of the American people is less important than the welfare of all men."

Secondly, he quoted: "Disability from causes subsequent and not attributable to war and the support of dependents of deceased veterans whose death is unconnected with war, have been to some measure accepted obligations of the nation as a part of the debt due."

"This is class legislation if enacted into law; it is not just. Good citizens in peace deserve as much consideration at the hands of their government as do good soldiers in war. The paragraph is an appeal for the veterans' vote."

Quoting another paragraph from the republican stand, "The restriction of immigration is a republican policy. Our party formulated the quota system," Rev. Mr. Ristow said:

"The quota system is no doubt a good one, just as it is clear that the Japanese exclusion act is vicious. The motive for immigration restriction seems to be selfish in much the same way that the tariff for protection is selfish. Jesus said: 'He that cometh unto me I will in no wise cast out. What should a Christian nation say to the immigrant?'

Another statement he picked out was: "We do not propose to reduce our navy defenses below that of any other nation. We believe that the army has reached the irreducible minimum consistent with the self-reliance, self-respect, and security of this nation."

Answering, Rev. Mr. Ristow said: "Such truculence is not Christian. The 'self-reliance, self-respect, and security' of a nation are based on justice and good will if they are Christian."

In another section, Rev. Mr. Ristow stated: "We recognize the Christian principle of interdependence and common interests of all men," referring to the republican stand. "We favor the participation by the United States in an international conference to consider matters relative to monetary questions... and possible co-operative action concerning them."

The republican viewpoint regarding further international conferences wherein it is stated: "We favor a measure that will authorize our government to call or to participate in an international conference in case of any threat of non-fulfillment of Article 2 of the Treaty of Paris (Kellogg-Brinard Pact)" was commented on by Rev. Mr. Ristow as follows: "This recognizes the Christian principle of co-operation."

The principle of the Hoover doctrine, mainly that this government will not recognize territory taken by force, was commented on, Rev. Mr. Ristow saying, "The refusal to recognize territory taken by force is in harmony with the Christian principle that the use of force is wrong."

The republican statement that the world court has been approved by three successive republican presidents was answered by the speaker who said: "This is at least the first mile on the road to world peace. The second mile involves love as well as justice."

In another paragraph taken from the republican stand Mr. Ristow quoted, "We believe in high wages. We favor the shorter work week and the shorter work day." In answer he said, "The Christian principle involves a more equitable sharing of the benefits of industry. High wages and short hours are an essential combination to that end."

Lesson Topic of Christian Science Is "Unreality"

We must hold forever the consciousness of existence, and sooner or later, through Christ and Christian Science, we must master sin and death. The evidence of man's immortality will become more apparent, as material beliefs are given up and the immortal facts of being are admitted" (p. 428).
