

HARRIS "DEBUNKS" GRAB BILL CLAIMS AT COTTAGE GROVE

COTTAGE GROVE, Oct. 5.—(Special)—Claims that the school removal or wrecking bill could make any savings in the cost of education in Oregon were shattered by Judge Lawrence T. Harris in a talk made before a dinner meeting of the chamber of commerce Tuesday night. Facts were presented to indicate that there would be no saving in the cost of added millions in state money for new buildings at Corvallis, while those at Eugene, Monmouth, Ashland and LaGrande, particularly those at Eugene, would be largely unused.

Tax rates over Lane county would be increased, Judge Harris said, because of depreciated valuations in Eugene which would result when \$3,000 students who spend a million or two a year, as well as members of the faculty, would be moved to Corvallis and a large proportion of business property would remain idle for years while the city was taking up the slack.

Judge Harris pointed out that, although the present millage rate of 2.94 is not disturbed by the school removal bill, the proponents claim that a saving of a million dollars a year could be saved, the reduction of a million dollars from the slightly more than two millions raised by the millage levy would leave less than is now required by the agricultural college with an enrollment of half what it would be if the university were removed to Corvallis, which would leave nothing for the medical school in Portland, nothing for the law school that would go to Salem, nothing for the teachers' college at Eugene, nothing for the normal schools that would become junior colleges.

Judge Harris pointed out that enrollment at both the university and college has decreased this year, in large measure because of the economic condition of the school removal bill has created. He went into the history of the "permanent" establishment of the university at Eugene when the pioneers of Lane county, during the years of one of the worst depressions the country has ever known, gave the state a tract of land and the money with which to erect Deady hall. He told how contributions were made in cows, horses, pigs, chickens and other livestock and these contributions turned into cash by the university committee.

Judge Harris referred to the estimate of Assessor Kenney that property valuations in Eugene would be reduced a third, that \$20 would be added to every \$1,000 of assessed valuation in that city and \$4.50 to every \$1,000 of valuation over the city. He also said that bonds issued by fraternal houses in Eugene would become worthless, while bonds issued by Eugene, Monmouth, Ashland and LaGrande would be greatly depreciated. He gave cogent reasons why no resident of Lane county, why no friend of the university, why no friend of the college, why no friend of the normals, why no one not interested in the schools of the state, why no taxpayer, why no one not even interested as a taxpayer could consistently vote for the school moving or wrecking bill.

In reply to a question, the speaker explained that residents of Corvallis were at first so certain that the removal bill would become law, that their plans had been so thoroughly made, that all property that would be benefited by the removal of the university to Corvallis had been placed under option by those who knew of the proposed plans.

HOOVER TALK STORY

reached enactment "It would have been the end of recovery." In his first campaign address since accepting the nomination, the chief executive said he favored such proposals as radical revision of the agricultural marketing act, readjustment of land taxes, reorganization of the federal land banks, and the application of any annual payment on war debts to "securing an expansion of the foreign markets for American agricultural products."

Higher Tariffs Seen
As another major point he promised his farm belt audience even higher tariffs than now existed on farm commodities "where necessary to protect agriculture."

Then, moving directly from criticism of the present tariff act by his democratic opponent, Franklin D. Roosevelt, he asserted: "What the democratic party proposes is to reduce your farm tariffs. Aside from ruin to agriculture, such an undertaking in the midst of this depression will disturb every possibility of recovery."

Earlier, Mr. Hoover listed proposals he said were initiated in the democratic controlled house of representatives "under the leadership of the gentleman who has been nominated vice-president and thus these measures and policies were approved by their party."

Ruins Confidence
The president named "a program of pork barrel legislation in the sum of \$1,200,000,000" the bonus bill, "the creation of sheer flat money," a bill "to destroy the effectiveness of the tariff commission," and "a price fixing bill."

"All this," he asserted, "undermined public confidence and delayed all the efforts of the administration and the powerful instrumentalities which we had placed in action to save the country."

"These measures representing the democratic control brought discontent and delay to recovery. That recovery began the moment when it was certain that these destructive measures of this democratic control in the house were stopped. Had their program passed it would have been the end of recovery. If it ever passes it will end hope and recovery."

"Do you propose to place these men in power and subject this country to that sort of measures and policies? It is by their acts in congress and their leadership that you shall know them."

Earlier, the chief executive recounted what he described as efforts of the administration against depression economic forces, and declared "a great national victory has been achieved." Speaking of the drive to maintain the United States on a gold basis, he said: "I won this great battle to protect our people and homes. We held the Gibraltar of world stability. The world today has a chance. It is growing in strength. Let that man who complains that things could not be worse thank God for this victory and make reverent acknowledgement of the courage and stamina of a great democracy."
