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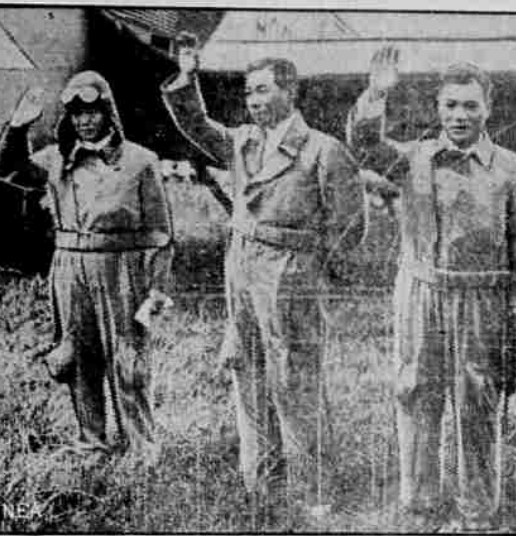
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## HOPE FADES FOR JAPANESE!

10 minutes. The two men stood still. "Al, this is from the heart," Roosevelt offered.

"Frank, that goes for me, too." The cameramen's flashlight boomed.

Smith began his speech. He addressed President Hoover and the administration. He called for election of the "national democratic ticket," and he urged harmony for "a democratic victory in November."

And he turned toward Roosevelt as he spoke, not however, mentioning the governor by name.

Roosevelt was grinning. A few moments later, Smith, referring to his own service as governor before Roosevelt, said:

"When I left the state in 1929, I felt satisfied for I left my program in the hands of Roosevelt and Lehman."

Roosevelt mentioned Smith twice in his concluding speech, praising his record as governor, as a humanitarian, a man "eminently fitted for the task" when he came to Albany.

## FIRE SURVEY STORY

men to the Stockade fire Wednesday morning.

It is hard to visualize the spectacle of the Mohawk fire. The thick, black smoke rolling up into the sky could be seen for hundreds of miles. An airman who hopped in at the Eugene post Tuesday said he could see it from Mt. Shasta in California. As the plane passed at an altitude of about 7,000 feet, several points of the big fire could be seen. The area from Wendell down to a point near Deerhorn was nearly a solid mass of smoke.

The Stockade fire is trailed on the east side and is giving trouble principally on the west. Several fires have burned into one, which covers several hundred acres. This fire is in an old burn, and the fire farther south are in logged off land.

In Eugene a whitish haze had settled during the day. As the plane climbed upward the first few thousand feet of altitude, the land below seemed to grow bluer and bluer. At an altitude of 8,000 feet a blue veil covered the entire country, though in the low valleys the smoke of the big fire had settled in a sickly whitish-yellow pall. Viewed from about 50 miles eastward, the Willamette valley, where ash from the big fire fell during the day, was only a blanket of white smoke.
