

FORESTRY SUBJECT AT TAX MEETING

COTTAGE GROVE, Oct. 6.—(Special)—Paul Pieper, district forest ranger, was the principal speaker at the regular meeting of the South Lane Taxpayers' league Tuesday evening. Mr. Pieper gave an instructive talk of the forest service, road and trail construction, the source of funds for such work and the method of cooperation between the forest service and the local relief work. Mr. Pieper praised La Selles Stewart for the efficient way he is handling the work he is now supervising.

Considerable work was disposed of by the league, and several resolutions were adopted, the most important being one instructing the legislative committee to inform the candidates seeking legislative places that support would be given to those candidates only who are known to be in favor of the reduction of automobile license to \$5 per year.

A document was read by the secretary, purporting to come from the county court in which the acknowledgment was made of a resolution from the league. The document claimed that the resolution dispatched by the league to the county court was unsigned. The document received by the league was not signed by any one. It was not mailed but was handed to the secretary by the chief of police as having come from Elbert Beale, as having come from the county court.

The secretary was instructed to proceed with the investigation of the proceedings of the court in the matter of the motor vehicle license deal with the state highway commission.

E. E. McLendon, secretary of the league, announced that he is an independent candidate for the office of justice of the peace in the Cottage Grove district.

The next meeting of the league will be on Nov. 1.

Reedsport Section Exceedingly Dry

REEDSPORT, Oct. 6.—(Special)—Continued dry weather and the slight precipitation of the past three months has added greatly to the heavy burden of lower Umpqua farmers. During the entire period only 2.06 inches of moisture were recorded at the Umpqua lighthouse.

During the month of September just passed, .53 of an inch was recorded, while in 1931, same month, 1.98 inches were recorded, and in September, 1929, only .36 of an inch.
