TODAY'S RECIPES

COOKIES always can fill in as a dessert with fresh or canned fruit, many a glass of milk disappears uncomplainingly when accompanied by a cookie, they are popular in the school lunch box, and a cup of tea seems twice as sociable if a plate of cookies is on the tea table. Drop cookies and over-night cookies do away with the tedious process of rolling and cutting. If rolled cookies are wanted, thorough chilling of the dough makes it much easier to handle.

The texture of cookies makes them easier to digest than cake. Plain sugar cookies can be given to small children long before they should be allowed to eat cake. Cookies with nuts and raisins are rather more difficult to digest but if the fruit and nuts are finely chopped they are not objectionable, and older children especially like them. Rolled oats cookies are easy to make and keep excellently.

Roll Oats Cookies

1 cup granulated sugar, 3-4 cup lard or other shortening, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup sweet milk, 2 cups rolled oats, 2 cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup seeded and chopped raisins. Cream shortening and add sugar slowly. Stir in 1 cup of flour. Add eggs well beaten. Mix and sift remaining flour with salt and cinnamon and add to first mixture. Add milk and vanilla. Dissolve soda in two teaspoons cold water and stir into mixture. Add rolled oats and raisins and mix well. Spread as thin as possible on oiled and floured pans, and bake 10 minutes in a moderate oven. Cut in two-inch squares. The recipe makes about five dozen cookies.

Hermits

Two cups light brown sugar, 2-3 cup shortening, 3 eggs, 1-2 cup sweet milk, 4 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup seeded and chopped raisins, 1 teaspoon each cinnamon and nutmeg, 1-2 teaspoon each cloves, ginger and allspice, 1-2 teaspoon salt. Cream shortening and gradually add sugar. Add eggs beaten until light with milk. Mix and sift flour, salt, spices, soda and baking powder. Mix thoroughly and drop from teaspoon onto oiled and floured cookie sheet. Bake 15 minutes in a moderate oven. The spiciness of these cookies make them ideal for the first chilly days of autumn.
