PULLET EGGS UP CENT; ALL OTHER MARKETS UNCHANGED

Local markets showed no changes for Saturday, although a good business was reported.

The boost on pullet eggs as forecast came true Saturday morning, and they were boosted to 18 cents, wholesale. The advance has been looked for.

Poultry, other prices on eggs, livestock, grains, butter and buttermilk continued unchanged.

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SESSION CONFUSED; COTTON BREAKS TO BRING ON DECLINE

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The stock market finished a session of confusion and price movement today with a wide assortment of small losses.

A favorable weekly report of the movement of revenue freight charged an early decline, but a break in cotton on publication of the government's monthly crop report, brought fresh selling in shares, which depressed many of the more active issues 1 to more than 2 points for a time.

There were numerous recoveries of a point or so in the late dealings, however, and at the finish, most losses ranged from fractions to a point. Trading was moderately active for a Saturday session, the turnover amounting to some 1,400,000 shares. The closing time was slightly heavy.

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PULLET EGGS UP CENT ON MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—The advance of 1c in the price of pullet eggs which became effective at the week-end by order of E. J. Dion, general manager of the Pacific Co-ops, indicates that in practically all positions the local market stands on firm ground. No changes were made in other sizes. The advance in pullets suggests not only a greater call but a lessened supply than seasonal.

There still appears a disposition on the part of outsiders to wreck the Portland market by their sales of undergrades to some of the larger consumers. These are taking the place of good eggs and naturally keeps the market from showing the strength the actual situation demands.

Little change is shown in outside markets for recent days.

There was no change in the general butter market trading for the week-end. Prices on the produce exchange were stationary for eggs as were offerings of these and prisms on the open market. Some followed the advance.

Market for chickens is very much inclined to show steadiness here. Since the failure of the plan of killers to keep down the buying price on light hens to 7c, everyone has appeared highly anxious to buy at 8c, which is only a fraction of its worth compared with San Francisco.

Everyone in the trade is anticipating an increased demand for dressed turkeys during the coming week if weather conditions continue cool. The suggestion, however, is that only matured stock be sent.

Generally steady trade conditions are suggested for practically all lines of country killed meats with lamb, held firm and real and hog prices, practically unchanged for the week-end.

Trade in peaches has practically disappeared from a small showing for always and clings. Little of the latter is arriving. Peaches are not bringing transportation charges.

With a general advance of shipping call, the market for lettuce is weak with an overabundance. Recent arrivals from California are considered much in the light of bringing apples to Hood River. More California are said to be due next week.

East Side Market

Beans showed indications of an early cleanup of offerings during the week-end session of the East Side Farmers' market. Stock sold 3-4c lb., generally the higher mark for green, yellow and yout. Offerings clearly showed the approaching end of the season.

New low record and the lowest ever known here was reached for cauliflower with sales as low as a dime a crate. The produce on hand available was 35-40¢ but little business passed above 15-20¢ crate. The crate alone cost about 8¢.

Demand for peppers was very good with decreasing supplies. Sales of green around 60-65¢ orange box. Red stock is unchanged.

Corn market was fairly steady; mostly 50¢ sack or crate.

Domestic corn sold at the recent high; selling 10-20¢ box.

Lettuce market was fairly steady at 65-75¢ crate for top stuff.

Red cabbage was 70¢ cantaloupe crate with regular stock mostly 30¢ for similar packs.

Cantaloupes sold \$1.12-1.25 with good stuff quickly sold at the top. Musk-melons around 75¢.

Green broccoli moved generally 35¢ lb.

Local potatoes were in small supply and fair call around 60-70¢ orange box for top stuff.

Danish squash ruled slow around 50¢ cantaloupe crate.

Rubabags were fairly steady but not a new one has been seen since moved 5¢ with Winter Bananas 40¢ and Jonathans 60¢ box.

Spinach market was well supplied, the bulk selling 35¢ orange box.

Domestic shell lima beans were fair around 40¢ lb.

Ice cream melons were 60¢ cantaloupe crate with casabas at a similar price.
