

MINING CONGRESS SUGGESTS LOAN

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 10.—(AP)—

A federal appropriation of \$100,000,000 to be divided among ten western states for mining development was suggested in a resolution adopted by the Western Oregon Mining Congress in session here Saturday.

The resolution proposes that the federal appropriation be loaned to install ore reduction equipment. The money would be handled according to the outlined plan by a commission appointed by the Reconstruction Finance corporation and would be loaned on a basis of 75 per cent of the value of the ore blocked out and in sight by the individual or company seeking the loan.

Dr. Warren D. Smith, head of the department of geology at the University of Oregon, suggested further that each state provide a board to handle any funds appropriated federally and that the board make a field survey of lands involved by anyone seeking a loan.

Representatives from Lane, Linn, Coos, and Douglas counties attended the congress.

exchange of fugitives, under which his case could be handled.

Personal Loss Heavy—Insull told police he was chairman of the Chicago Gas and Electricity Co., and three other concerns which had gone bankrupt with liabilities of \$300,000,000. In addition to his own loss of \$100,000,000, he said his wife had lost \$50,000,000.

Insull, declaring he knew nothing of the proceedings against him beyond what had appeared in the papers, denied the charges. When arrested, he was carrying 6,000 Italian lire (\$307), ten pounds sterling (\$85), and \$400 in American money. Police granted his request for permission to see the local manager of the American Express Co.

Flight Is Quiet

The aged utilities executive had made a secret but none the less dramatic flight from Paris, across Italy, and to Greece. Advised by Paris lawyers that Greece offered the safest haven in Europe, he left his wife ill in a modest Paris hotel and quietly left France for Italy, with his son, Samuel Jr.

If French or Italian frontier guards were aware that the builder of one of the greatest industrial empires in history was passing through their territory they kept quiet about it. There was no trace at Mondone, on the French-Italian frontier, that Insull and his son had passed there.

The Insulls reached Milan without attracting attention, although most of the newspaper correspondents in Europe were looking for them. There Samuel, Sr., bought a railroad ticket to Brindisi, from where he went by seaplane to Athens, and his son returned to Paris.
