

VISIONS OF LEGAL BEER CAUSES HOP MARKET TO JUMP

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 11.—(Special)—Visions of return of legalized beer helped inspire the Pacific coast hop market to cheerfully skip and jump this year.

An increase from an early season price of 12 cents a pound to present closing quotations of 16 1/2 cents also was caused by short crop both in the United States and Europe, veteran dealers said today.

Former brewery interests, Oregon hop men have learned, are taking renewed interest in long-time contracts, hoping to profit from present low prices when the 18th amendment becomes history. Approximately eight per cent of the normal 100,000 bale Oregon crop already has been bought several years into the future.

Increased impetus to gain control of one of the principal ingredients of malt liquors resulted when the downy mildew blight spread to Oregon, center of the hop market. Oregon's production for the season just completed was only 65,000 bales, of some 200 pounds each.

The California crop of 35,000 bales this year and 10,500 bales in the state of Washington were both below normal. New York state, only other hop growing section of any consequence in the United States, is considered by local hop men "practically out of the running."

Crop shortage in the United States is placed at 25 per cent and in Europe, principally Germany and England, at 33 per cent.

Oregon hop men, encouraged by the 33 per cent increase in price this year, have organized for a drive to wipe out the state's bone dry law, and for swift repeal of the 18th amendment.
