

MORO TRIBESMEN STILL HOLD OUT

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 12.—(AP)—

Warlike tribesmen, entrenched behind their fortified stronghold at Tayum, continued to defy native constabulary today and appeared ready for an impending battle.

Members of the constabulary, who have hesitated to attack the stronghold because of the large number of women and children living with the tribesmen, practiced throwing hand grenades today. They were understood to be planning an attack upon the fortified kota tomorrow unless the Moros surrender.

Princess Tarhata, niece of Sultan Kiram of Sulu, former student of Illinois, has attempted to persuade the tribesmen to surrender peacefully, but thus far her efforts have been unavailing, according to dispatches received here.

Trouble with the Moros developed several days ago when Lieutenant Vicente Alagar and 11 of his constabulary men were killed during a "peace" meeting with the tribesmen. Lieutenant Alagar had sought the conference with Hadji Abdullah in an attempt to have the Moros leader surrender for trial on a robbery charge.

believe contained the bomb, sat nearby.

"We walked out together at about 1:50 p. m., the man still holding the bag," he said. "A few feet away the man nudged me and pointed to a spot about 250 feet distant. He excused himself for a minute and told me where to put the suitcase. He said he would be back soon."

Callicotte went without hesitation to the spot where he insists he left the suitcase and then walked away. "I don't recall if the parade was in progress at the time," he asserted, "but I remember seeing a mounted policeman at the corner of Stuart street."

That officer, police records show, was Francis Gaddy, now a corporal in the police department.

Later Callicotte charged San Francisco police officers with removing 11 dairies from his Portland home. Inspector Charles Maher, who with Captain Charles Goff questioned Callicotte in Portland, and admitted he had taken the dairies. "We are looking them over and will return them when we are ready," Maher declared.

Columbus Man of Many Birthplaces And Nationalities

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Today is the 440th anniversary of the day Christopher Columbus discovered a new continent and in the intervening years mystery has made a muddle of the birthplace, racial origin and voyage of the famous discoverer.

He was born, it appears from modest research, in Genoa and several other towns in Italy, on at least two Mediterranean islands, in Spain, Portugal, Armenia and Corsica. He also was a Jew. Some scholars contend he did not discover America at all, that he was a pirate who had crossed with some Danes before 1492.

The birthplace presents the most complicated puzzle. In his will Columbus said he was born in Genoa. An old document found in the vatican insists he was born at Cogoleto. An equally ancient book found in Milan ascribes his birthplace to Majorca. Spain claims he was born in Galicia. A German novelist, Jacob Wassermann, declares he was a Spanish Jew and his name was Colon or Colom.

The Portuguese Academy of Sciences, however, claims positive proof that Columbus was born in Portugal and that he made the first report of his discovery not to Ferdinand and Isabella but to the king of Portugal. France says Columbus saw the light of day in the village of Calvi, Corsica, but Armenians argue his real name was Kaholombian and that without question he was born at Mount Aarat.

fighting are under control and the rain is putting them out and soaking down vegetation enough to keep them from spreading. The fire situation in the last week was most serious in the western part of the county. Fires in the east are all put down, but a rain is needed to moisten the vegetation, which has become the driest the county has experienced since 1890.

Farmers and horticulturists welcomed the rainfall, which is a boon to the potato crops and nut orchards. This rain is the first since Sept. 12, when only twelve hundredths of an inch fell in Eugene.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The first soaking rain in four and a half months continued in northwestern Oregon today while southern Oregon continued to scan the skies for some sign of precipitation, and showers visited the eastern portion of the state.

Portland had nearly .70 of an inch of rain up to 9 a. m. today, or more than half the total amount of the previous four months. The rainfall in this area was general and was especially needed in the parched and burning forest fire area near Portland.

The rains were heavy over the Columbia river district, amounting to as much as 1.20 at the mouth of the river. They were general up and down the coast as far as Coos Bay where they dwindled to mere showers.

It was feared not enough rain had fallen over the Coos county forest fire region to give full relief there. Neither Medford nor Roseburg had any rain Tuesday or last night.

Light showers were reported from Spokane, Yakima and Moscow. Interim rains were forecast for today, tonight and Thursday.
