

STUDENT PETITIONS TO RE-ENTER U. O.

A petition seeking re-instatement in the University of Oregon has been filed by Omar Hoskins, Cottage Grove student expelled for driving a car without a permit, and will be considered by the faculty committee at its next regular meeting, it was announced Thursday by Carleton E. Spencer, chairman of the faculty committee.

The next meeting is scheduled for Friday afternoon but may be postponed till Monday on account of excessive business details pressing upon the committee, Mr. Spencer said. After Hoskins' petition for re-instatement has been approved, he may then apply for a permit to drive his car to and from school. He lives in Cottage Grove.

In interpreting the rules regarding driving cars, the faculty committee Wednesday declared that Eugene students could drive their family cars when ordered to do so by the family, but could not drive them to affairs conducted under the auspices of the university. The statement said the students "may not drive a car for any social purpose or for pastime... local students will not be subject to penalty for driving their family cars on family business at the order of the parent, if such business has no connection with the student's connection with the university."

MORE RAIN COMING

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Moderate but general rains continued during the night and this morning over western Oregon, extending into the Coos Bay country and as far south as Roseburg, and bringing relief from serious forest fires in that section. About a quarter of an inch of rain fell on Coos Bay during the night, the first help of consequence fire fighting crews have had since the fires started.

Portland today had received .51 of an inch of rain since the drought was broken.

The weather bureau reported today that occasional rains tonight and Friday were in store for Oregon and Washington, with showers in northern Idaho.

COOS RELIEVED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Drenching rains in the Tioga forest fire area permitted scores of weary fire fighters to return to their homes today. Many had spent more than a month in the woods and they looked like veritable cave-men. Only a small group was left on patrol duty.

Rain was expected generally over the inland area today. During the night precipitation amounting to .12 of an inch fell in the Coos country, reducing the fire hazard greatly. All fires, including the Tioga blaze, are well under control. Further rains would end the season's fire trouble within 48 hours.

Bright Spots

CHICAGO.—Five new and re-opened banks with a capital in excess of \$5,000,000 was the outstanding feature of the Rand-McNally weekly report on the national banking situation this week. This is the largest single week since February 18, 1931, and is 50 per cent above the 1932 weekly average.

CHICAGO.—Shipments by air express in the last 14 days were 30 per cent larger than in any two-week period of the year, the United Air Lines reported today.

CLEVELAND.—Increased business business made it necessary to return 250 men to work at the William Hardie company candy factory.

CLEVELAND.—Approximately 1,200 men will be returned to the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company ore mines in upper Michigan on November 1, after a five months layoff, it was announced today.

NEW YORK.—Business failures in the last week totaled 433, the lowest figure since November, 1931, and comparing with 467 in the preceding week, Bradstreet's reported.

ATLANTA, Ga.—A 10 per cent

wage increase was given 4000 employees of the Calloway group of cotton mills.

NEW YORK.—Wholesalers reported a good market in western New York prunes of the Fellenberg variety.

PHILADELPHIA.—Electric output of North American company subsidiaries has shown a progressive increase of volume for each week since Labor day as compared with a progressive decrease during the corresponding weeks of last year, Frank L. Dane, chairman, said.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio.—Republic Steel corporation resumed operations at its Niles, O., sheet plant.

DETROIT.—Shipments of Hudson and Essex cars in September were 1230 units in excess of September, 1931, it was reported.

PHILADELPHIA.—Pennsylvania railroad placed orders at three of its shops for construction of 1285 box cars, for which 19,000 tons of steel will be required.

NEW YORK.—Another rise in steel operations was reported by "Iron Age."

MILL OWNERS MEET WITH WHOLESALERS

Lumber mill owners of the Willamette valley met with Portland and Eugene wholesalers this week and discussed plans for closer cooperation between manufacturers and wholesale men in trade practices.

Sixty per cent of the valley lumber marketed is sold through wholesale firms, and the valley lumbermen feel that close cooperation with these men is desirable.

Practically all the mill owners of the county attended. Eugene wholesalers who attended the meeting were Verl Smith, Austin Dodds, George P. Hitchcock, J. E. Jacobson, Mark Johnson, O. J. Celoria, Arthur Morris and E. H. Peters. Portland wholesalers present were Harry Aldrich, E. T. Sturgeon, C. C. Patrick and R. S. van Deine.

Warlike Moros Are Routed By Constabulary

JOLO, P. I., Oct. 12.—(AP)—In fierce fighting today the highly trained Philippine constabulary routed warlike Moro outlaws from their fortified village of Tayungnan. One constabularyman and five Moros were known to have been killed.

After three days of fruitless negotiation to obtain surrender of the outlaw leaders, 60 constabularymen attacked the entrenched Sulus at 7 a. m. Hand grenades, rifles and bolo knives in the fighting which lasted until 3 p. m.

The natives fled their village, in which 400 warriors, women and children had taken refuge, shortly after the constabulary attacked. Scattering, the Moros continued sniping for hours. Another battle was expected tomorrow.

One constabularyman was killed and six slightly wounded. Captain Leon Angeles, provincial commander, who led the assault, said he believed the Moro casualties exceeded the five known to have been slain.

Today's fighting brought deaths from the latest Moro outbreak, which started with Sunday's ambush in which 10 constabularymen were slain, to 40.
