

MRS. C. I. COLLINS DIES HERE THURSDAY

Mrs. Genevieve Spencer Collins died Thursday afternoon at the Eugene hospital at the age of 56 years. She is survived by her widower, C. I. Collins, and one son, Spencer Collins of Eugene, as well as one sister, Mrs. George S. Davenport, Passaic, New Jersey.

Mrs. Collins was an active worker in the Methodist Episcopal church and was a member of the Eugene Monday Book club.

She was born in Pierpont, Ohio, May 31, 1876. She lived in Florida and Michigan and came to Eugene in 1913.

Funeral services are to be held at the Veach chapel, Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, Rev. Cecil F. Ratow of the Methodist Episcopal church officiating. Interment will be in the Rest Haven Memorial park.

DOG LICENSE FEES WILL BE REDUCED

Reduction of county dog license fees to \$1 for male and \$1.50 for female animals was announced Friday by the county court.

The reduction was made after C. R. Downing, William Bainbridge and L. E. Parks, supervisors of the dog control district, drew a resolution asking for the cut.

They held that the old \$2 and \$3 fees were no longer necessary, as the sheep-killing dogs of the county have been practically all been killed and sheep claims filed with the board have consequently been cut in half. Sheep claims were paid from the license fees collected.

BRUINS IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—(AP)—Unsettled about his starting lineup, but very pert and hopeful, Coach Bill Spaulding and his Bruins from the University of California at Los Angeles, reached Portland today, all set for a football tussle with the Oregon Webfoots on Multnomah field here tomorrow.

With the possibility that the game will be played on a wet field, Coach Spaulding was considering altering the attack planned for the Oregon game. It is likely, he said, that Bob McChesney and Walter Muller, sophomore ends, will start in place of Bill Maxwell and Art Piver. Eddie Austin and Teek Baldwin probably will get the guard berths, the implication being that Spaulding wants all the weight possible to combat the offensive of the Oregon team as well as to lead the interference for his own team's attack.

Constabulary and Moros Under Truce

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 14.—(AP)—Fighting between Moro tribesmen and 400 members of the Philippine native constabulary was halted temporarily today while Princess Tarbata and Colonel Stevens, director of the non-Christian tribes of Teopisto and Gungona, continued attempts to induce the outlaws to surrender without further bloodshed.

One member of the constabulary and at least five tribesmen were killed during a skirmish on the island of Jolo, where the warriors were entrenched in a fortified native village. The Moros scattered into the brush, and a truce was observed when the princess and Stevens arrived there from Manila and began conferring with leaders of the fighting tribes.

HEAVIER RAINFALL RECEIVED IN LANE

All sections of the county were well soaked with rain during the night, reducing the fire hazards in the forests and helping crops.

The Cascade area received the most rain, nearly an inch having fallen at McKenzie Bridge. Half an inch fell at Roseburg and 25 inches at Oakridge. Rain was heavy in western Lane county, and the Siuslaw national forest was taking off short term fire fighters.

In Eugene, .54 inches fell.

DON'T COOK TOO LONG

Long cooking toughens the fiber of cabbage, although the idea is prevalent that cabbage must stay on the stove a long time to become tender. Ten or 15 minutes is enough for new cabbage. Half an hour is long enough, usually, for the oldest leaves. When cabbage has been properly boiled its texture resembles that of asparagus. Don't expect it to be soft as a boiled potato.

SLIP-COVER TIP

If you are fitting slip-covers on sofas or chairs stand directly in front of the piece of furniture, throw the cover over the back of it, and then draw it down, working into place. Make sure that every inch of the cover is perfectly smooth. If you try to adjust the covers to the arms of a chair, before considering the back, you will have a crooked effect.

If you are weary of your upholstered furniture, slip-covers will bring new life to your living room. Have two sets of them. A gay set for summer, and something warmer and a little heavier for winter will make your living room suit the season.

Hoover's Hand Lame After Handshaking

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—(AP)—White House aides today said President Hoover had entirely recovered except for a somewhat bruised right hand from the effects of last night's strenuous reception from which he was forced to withdraw after shaking hands with more than 3,000 guests.

Members of his staff emphasized that Mr. Hoover was in good physical condition. They said the bruises to his hand, caused by too many vigorous handshakes, were the principal reason for the president's retiring last night.

Winter Doesn't Chill These Boys!

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 14.—When winter's blizzards from the north whip the gridiron on which the football team of St. Louis university plays its late games, two of that school's players will be right at home in the frigid temperature.

The two gridlers, Joe O'Connor, end, and George Nisbet, tackle, conditioned themselves last summer by working in an Arctic seal fishery.

The boys were well up north, being located in a fishery on St. Paul's Island, one of the Pribilof group in the Bering Sea, 200 miles west of the Alaskan mainland, and more than 2200 miles north of Seattle, Wash.

The weather was plenty cold all the time the boys were there, ranging from 20 to 40 degrees above zero. With this snappy weather they attempted to teach the Eskimo laborers the rudiments of football, but the northerners weren't so hot for that game. When a baseball was produced, however, they took to it like a duck to water.

The work itself was conditioning, consisting of stripping blubber off seals. Sometimes one man would strip as many as 100 seals in a day.
