An unusually interesting Parent Teacher association program was given Thursday afternoon when the Washington school unit met.

The mothers assembled at two-thirty o'clock, and were taken from room to room to see the children at work, the program being a demonstration one.

In the first grade room, taught by Miss Vera Mannel, the youngsters gave a reading lesson from large charts on the wall.

The second graders, taught by Miss Mabel Simmons, gave an interesting demonstration on methods of teaching arithmetic. The children in this part of the grade are learning to read and write the numbers in all combination to 100. Several lessons in rapid card reading were also demonstrated as well as blackboard work where the children learned the "stories of five and six," or, adding and subtracting the various numbers that will make five and six; or, the "stories of the rabbits and the horses," in which they did the same thing orally.

Next came the fourth grade B and third grade A room's geography lesson. Mrs. Edna Brockman being the teacher. Here an oral lesson was given, the children answering questions on the seven continents, where they are, how to get there, what kind of climate is characteristic, etc.

The fifth grade room brought the "big words." This room is taught by Miss Alice Jenkins. The class pronounced several unusual words on the board, then gave the definition of each, and finally gave a sentence using each word. Following this there was a reading lesson.

In the sixth grade, taught by Miss Ida Patterson, principal of the school, the visitors found an interesting text on technical English, the children learning the various uses of words, nouns, pronouns, adjectives, etc., a demonstration given on the kinds of adjectives, including the "point out" ones, the "number" ones, and the "description" ones.

Following the demonstrations there was a short program, Louise Baker playing a piano solo, "Yellow Butterfly," and Margaret DeCoe playing piano solo, "Happy Farmer."

The business meeting was then conducted, Mrs. Lawrence Jensen, president, presiding. The group discussed the plan of organizing a study club and it was decided that members interested meet next Tuesday afternoon at two-thirty o'clock at the home of Mrs. Jensen for the radio program given for P. T. A. clubs.

Following the business meeting, a Halloween tea was served, the officers and teachers being hostesses, including Miss Patterson, Miss Mannel.
