

PROGRAM FEATURES FOR MASS MEETING AT ARMORY LISTED

The place of the Eugene Gleemen on the program at the university mass meeting at the Eugene armory Wednesday night has been changed from 7:30 to eight o'clock, it was announced Monday by E. G. Harlan, secretary of the chamber of commerce who is arranging the program.

John Stark Evans, director of the Gleemen, urged all Gleemen to be at the armory in time for the program at eight o'clock.

At the start of the program Abbie Green's band will play a concert and several numbers have been prepared for the event, Green announced Monday.

The meeting is for the purpose of telling the public the progress of the fight against the Zorn-Macpherson school wrecking bill and to outline plans for the fight in the future.

A feature of the mass meeting will be the attempt to mail at least 10,000 letters over the state that night. Citizens of this county have been urged to write letters to their friends and relatives throughout the state, urging their cooperation in defeating the bill. Every person is urged to write at least five letters and bring them to the meeting at the armory Wednesday night. Citizens also are urged to enclose literature, especially the pamphlet containing Governor Meier's statement on the measure, in their letters. This literature may be obtained from Little Dandy.

University groups are planning to keep Wednesday night free and a 100 percent attendance on the part of the faculty and student body is expected.

State college, was presented in which he asked that he be given a sabbatical leave for the college year and be paid \$1,552. Action was dismissed until later.

Barker \$1 a Year
Chancellor Kerr, who was at the table with board members and who took an active part in discussions on various issues when questioned by board members, said Dr. Jordan was summarily dismissed last April in accordance with the board's sweeping reorganization. Callister, after opposing the leave for Dean Lawrence, asked if approval of the request would mean that Jordan would return to the state's employ at the end of the year's leave.

Dr. Kerr replied that such was the implication, even though Dr. Jordan had been dismissed. E. G. Pease, member from The Dalles, asked if Dr. Jordan would have been dismissed if Dr. Kerr had been chancellor at that time. The chancellor said he would not have been ousted, and he praised Dr. Jordan as being "very competent."

Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the university, at his own request was today placed by the board on a "dollar a year" basis.

Would Close KOAC
In response to a request from the Tax Reduction league for certain detailed information regarding costs of various institutions in past years, the board today adopted a policy of making published reports of the past available where possible and of referring inquiries to such reports.

The board held that any organization or individual is entitled to such information but that it cannot spend public funds for making every detailed report called for.

Mrs. Pierce, in her communication to the other board members, requested that all increased salary action of the board be reconciled because of the acute financial situation; she recommended that the board economize, protested against increased student fees, costs and tuition and dormitory requirements, and suggested "elimination of duplication and wasteful administrative overhead" and of the radio station on the Corvallis campus.

Cost Too High
"It is not a lack of cars which keeps students away," she wrote, "but lack of money, increased fees and costs. I believe the board is doing a great injustice to Oregon young people. Costs must be cut."

Her reference to automobiles was in regard to the action of the board in refusing to permit students to operate cars during the school year without a special permit.

The board took up Mrs. Pierce's letter after it had been passed over once in the dock. There was little discussion beyond a reading of a communication praising the board for its stand in behalf of the operation of the college radio station, KOAC. Mrs. Pierce has repeatedly advocated the reduction of costs of education, always insisting that the taxpayers of the state are so burdened with their tax loads that they cannot continue much longer under the present system.

The rules committee, composed of B. F. Irvine, C. C. Coit, and Chairman C. L. Starr agreed to meet later in the day to define the duties of the chancellor so there may be no friction between the board and the chancellor.

Eugene Boy to Be In Eastern School

Obituaries
Mrs. Mary Conkright Koonz, pioneer resident of the Halsey section and widow of the late M. V. Koonz, died Saturday evening at her home at the age of 81 years, following a lingering illness.

Mrs. Koonz was born in Niles, Mich., Dec. 19, 1856. Her parents died when she was a child. In 1897 she came to Oregon and lived with Mr. and Mrs. Harry Rudd who took up a donation claim at Peoria. She lived there until her marriage to Mr. Koonz on Dec. 3, 1874, when she moved to Halsey. Mr. Koonz had been clerk for the Thompson store, a pioneer institution in Peoria. When the railroad was put through Halsey, the store was moved to Halsey. Two years later, 1876, Mr. Koonz bought the store from Mr. Thompson and the store is still in operation today as M. V. Koonz and company. Mr. Koonz died many years ago.

Mrs. Koonz is survived by one son, Clyde H. Koonz, and one daughter, Mrs. Edith Drinkard, both of Halsey, one brother, Tom Conkright, Tacoma, Wash., and four grandchildren in Halsey.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Halsey Methodist Episcopal church. Rev. Omer Ide officiating. Interment will be in the Pine Grove cemetery, Dana C. Rothman chapel in charge.

up the slack. We hold that it is an obligation on industry as a whole to make these adjustments as industry becomes mechanized.

"After all, industry is for the public welfare. The making of money must be a secondary principle. There is an awakened social consciousness of that fact. And if the present order—the capitalistic system—of private initiative and ownership is to survive that fact must be recognized and respected."

Green said the share-work program, now officially sponsored by President Hoover through a group headed by Walter C. Teagle, president of the Standard Oil company, of New Jersey, was a move in the right direction.

Narcotic Worker Will Speak Here
K. J. Tenney, national organizer for the White Cross Anti-Narcotic society, is in Eugene with W. E. Roberts, field representative, arranging an educational program. Through the cooperation of H. B. Johnson, principal of the Eugene high school, the first of a series of lectures by Earl A. Dowell, national lecturer for the White Cross, will occur at the high school's general assembly on Tuesday, October 25.

A local committee is being formed of Eugene citizens who are interested in the suppression of the narcotic traffic.

Mr. Tenney states that fully one-half of the holdups and thefts in every city are committed by addicts under the spur of pain caused by inability to obtain narcotics. He also claims that the average age of addicts is only 21, and that most of them become victims innocently of the peddlers who engage in the traffic as a business.

The White Cross is sponsoring narcotic research in the medical school of the University of California, and plans to popularize its findings, together with the recent findings of the Rockefeller Foundation and the United States government, all of which

have been carrying on extensive investigation.

Parents are requested to write in the names of their children of school age, the school they are attending and the grade. Teachers in the schools are requested to see that they get a slip returned from each home by Friday, Oct. 21.

The results of this year's census will be checked against the names on the cards from last year and the list will be brought up to date.

Wallows Loses
Wallows county reported a loss in both republican ranks and in the total. The loss was 238 in the former while there were 81 less registered than in 1928. The report shows 1,872 republicans, 1,526 democrats, 52 from other parties for a total of 3,450.

Of the twenty counties filing complete returns to date Washington county reported the largest registration with 18,927. The democrats gained 1,260, republicans 1,013 for
