

FARM STRIKERS BLOCKADE ROADS INTO TWIN CITIES

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 18.—(AP)—The line of farm pickets around the twin cities was completed today with farmers on the southern city limits joining in the blockade.

Some 250 farmers decided to join in the picketing. They had debated the same subject Saturday night for five hours without reaching a decision. The ring about Minneapolis and St. Paul is completed with pickets on highways in all directions.

Aided by Charles Nelson, Elk River marshal, 25 trucks ran through the blockade north of Minneapolis near midnight last night. Pickets had relaxed their watch.

Yards Hit Slightly

However, six more trucks were turned back. The drivers were told all they would get for their trouble was punctured tires.

Farmers massed today to move their picket lines to the Ramsey county (St. Paul) boundary line today in an effort to stop all trucks coming from northern Wisconsin counties. Yesterday pickets near Stillwater stopped a U. S. mail truck. Postal authorities were making a complete investigation of the affair.

At South St. Paul where the livestock market is located, authorities said that the receipts were only slightly less than usual although the number of trucks was smaller. Cattle, hogs and sheep were coming in by train.

MANITOBA REBUKED

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 18.—(AP)—Members of Manitoba's farmers' "army," which marched to the capitol here last week-end to protect against economic conditions, faced the prospect today of trading 100 miles to their homes with a rebuke from the government for their pains.

"You have ruined your chances of ever getting a hearing here again," Premier John Bracken told them.

The premier's address was made to Michael Sawiak of Winnipeg, who headed the delegation. Sawiak was asked whether he was a communist and he refused to reply.

"You know," the premier told the farmers, "the government had refused to hear any deputations accompanied by such a demonstration as you have here today. I want you to realize we won't be used for this sort of propaganda again."

The premier refused the marchers free transportation back to their homes, some of them 100 miles away. They had walked here of their own free will, he said, and would have to walk back.

only by special permit may cars be parked on the campus during class.

Three-Point Setup Given
In discussing the financial setup, Dr. Kerr spoke of a three-point program providing that there shall be no increase in student fees; no requests to the legislature for additional appropriations; and that budgets shall be adjusted on the basis of income available from present legislation.

The chancellor said such action must be taken in spite of reduced income from student fees as the result of decreased enrollment, and from the millage tax, owing to decrease in property valuation.

The board agreed to broaden the authority of the chancellor to extend his jurisdiction over the business offices, physical plants, registrar's office, information service, publications and news bureau. He was designated as the "chief executive officer," responsible to the board.

Budget Reduced
Budget reductions estimated at 7 per cent for the first year and 6.3 per cent for the second year will have to be made, Dr. Kerr said, because of anticipated shrinkage in millage receipts and student fees. He assumed, he said, that the appropriation of \$1,181,000 referred to the people would be lost. The higher education system started the year with a slight balance, since \$25,000 can be saved in administrative expense under the new setup.

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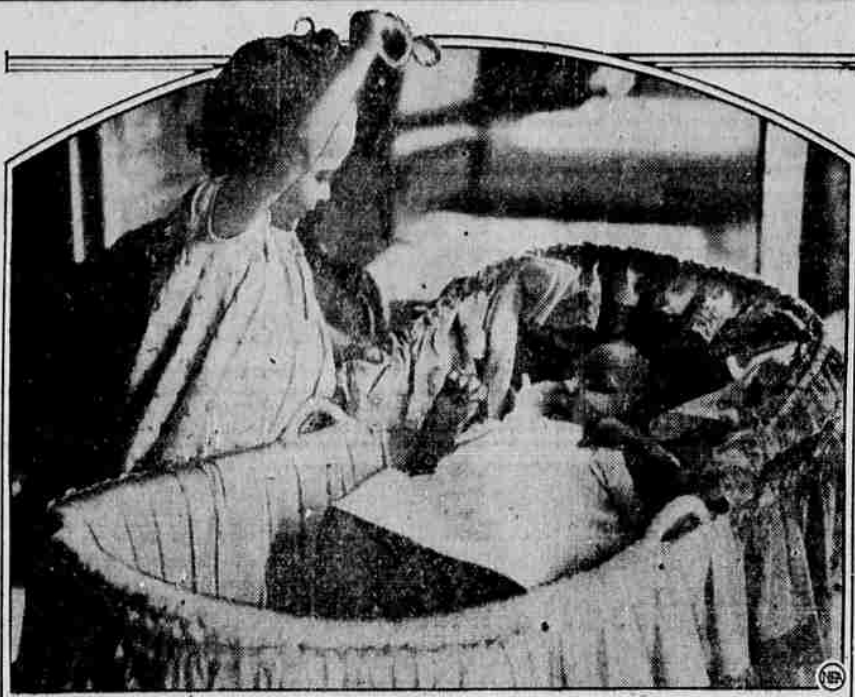

Socialists and Christian Ideal Subject in Talk

The socialist party, seemingly, is the one group of the present time that finds comfort and strength in the quotation of scripture to sustain its point, said Rev. Milton S. Weber, pastor of Central Presbyterian church, in a talk Sunday evening at the cooperative service held by his church, and by the Methodist Episcopal, and the Congregational churches. His talk was the third of a series of "Political Parties and the Christian Ideal."

His talk in part follows:

"I personally feel that the Old Testament has much to teach the present generation regarding moralism, taxes, and the welfare of the individual man. The main issue in socialism seems to be in the fact that it seeks a cooperative society, run much on the plan of our local schools and churches, without the profit motive. This is highly distasteful to most men, as is the stewardship of possessions as taught by Jesus. The principle of sharing with one another, the burdens, joys and advantages of society rather than the competitive spirit of the free fight, should do much to get us away from that system which has made possible the Stinnes of Germany, the Krugers of Sweden and the Insull of America. Mr. Insull's control extended into 4475 different communities, 30 different states and Canada. Illinois alone furnished 250,000 purchasers of the worthless stocks and bonds offered by his companies."

"Yet on the very day that the Chicago Tribune dismissed one of its own staff of writers for having participated in the Insull funds, their front page editorial blindly called for a return to the 'old days of Untrammeled personal initiative.' About 10,000 banks have failed in the United States during the depression. None in Canada. The Encyclopedia Britannica says that the municipalities of Canada are largely organized with a form of municipal socialism."

"Milwaukee with its freedom from gangsters, is about the main large city where socialism has had a chance to function. Perhaps it will always be a losing cause but we are all more or less affected by socialistic ideals and if we could give it some other name such as Christian stewardship many people would find satisfaction in its principles. When it comes to the presidential vote, I happen to have a few choice prejudices, and if I cannot vote for a dry, I shall vote against wrecking higher education in Oregon and then return home. No person may question my good citizenship with that kind of a vote."
