SALARY SLASH STORY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

The governor's recommendation for the maximum salary reduction of 15 per cent will not only affect his own salary but those of six other department heads. Dr. W. J. Kerr's salary as chancellor of the state's higher institutions of learning will be reduced from \$12,000 a year to \$9,000, while that of the secretary of the state board of higher education will likewise come under this classification.

Justices of the state supreme court will receive \$5,625 a year instead of \$7,500, which figures also apply to the salaries of the governor and public utilities commissioner in the same amount. The saving from the seven justices of the state supreme court alone amounts to \$13,125 a year. The state purchasing agent, the state budget director and the superintendent of state banks also come under the maximum.

State officials coming under the 16 per cent reduction schedule include:

and for salaries from \$300 to \$500, and the maximum cut of 15 per cent for salaries of \$500 and above.

In addition to the salary reduction the governor in his message will outline what savings he desires in each department during the next two years. The budget now being prepared, and which will be submitted to the ways and means committee along with a special message by the governor, will show the administration savings the past year and requirements for the forthcoming administration, including reductions.

The 1933-1934 budget will be submitted to legislators one month prior to the opening of the January session, Budget Director Hansen said. This is being done in order that members of the two houses will have time to study the requirements before coming to Salem, and thus speed up the appropriation legislation.

In the interests of simplification

and speed, Hansen will draft all measures in blank form for the ways and means committee for each department. These will accompany his budget estimates and should make it possible for the appropriation bills to come out the first month of the session rather than on the last few days, Hansen said. This is the first time in Oregon history such a plan has been adopted.

Hansen is further revising the budget form to cut down the size of the book and to present each department figures so they may be studied at a glance. His form outlines the revenues whether from fees or from taxes, the spending totals the past two years and the governor's recommendations for the next two years. These summaries are then broken down in detail.

Would Cut Kerr

the secretary of state and the state treasurer as those taking the largest reduction in this classification. Others in order will be the attorney general, superintendent of state police, state director of agriculture, the three tax commissioners, adjutant general, health officer, state engineer, superintendent of schools, state librarian and secretary of the bonus commission.

Department heads included in the 12 per cent reduction are state forester, insurance commissioner, corporation commissioner, three industrial accident commissioners, clerk of the state land board, labor commissioner and state printer. All other employees will be affected by the 5 and 8 per cent schedules.

In the preparation of the budget, Hansen said, the schedule will be applied to circuit court judges and district attorneys as well as the justices of the supreme court. Since the constitution provides that the compensation of the supreme court justices and circuit judges shall not be diminished during the term for which they were elected, the governor will request they waive this constitutional provision.

Governor Meier has called a conference of the members of the state board of control in Portland tomorrow at which the new budget estimates will be one of the major subjects for consideration.
