## Capone Seeking His Freedom From Prison

**ATLANTA, Oct. 19.—(AP)**—Prisoner 40,890 will put aside his blue-gray denim uniform tomorrow or Thursday and "Scarface" Al Capone, Chicago's erstwhile gang chieftain, will emerge from Atlanta federal penitentiary to wage another legal battle for his freedom.

His petition for a writ of habeas corpus is scheduled to be heard in federal court tomorrow before Judge Marvin Underwood, but a trial now in progress may delay it for a day. The gangster is serving a 10-year sentence for a violation of the income tax laws in 1926, 1927 and 1928, and seeks his freedom on the contention that prosecution is barred by the statute of limitations.

**Food Prices In Many Cities Show Decline in Month**

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—(AP)**—The department of labor today said retail food prices in 51 cities decreased one-half of one per cent in the month ending September 15, bringing the average drop during the past year to 16 per cent.

Decreases were observed during the month on 24 articles of food, among them potatoes, corn, tomatoes, bread and some meats. Fresh eggs, coffee, milk, butter, cheese and some meats showed increases.

The drop in prices was reported from 32 of the 51 cities, with 15 registering average increases and four showing no change. Los Angeles had the biggest gain with 8 per cent. Omaha showed 2 per cent advance and the others one or less. All cities showed food price declines for the year.

**Registration Of Democrats Gains**

**SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—(AP)**—A gain of more than a half million in democratic registration in California for the November election, reducing to less than 400,000 the republican lead of nearly a million in 1928, was revealed today by an Associated Press tabulation of complete semi-official registration figures from all but one county in the state.

Reports from 57 counties placed the republican registration in President Hoover's home state at 1,539,509, a gain of 3,809 over 1928, and the democratic voting strength at 1,147,414, an increase of 555,253 over 1928. The state total of 2,686,923 in the 57 counties set a new record.
