BIG AND SMALL GIFTS NEEDED.

TO meet the radio attack which the promoters of the Zorn-Macpherson school wrecking bill are making, cash contributions are being received at Little Deady. The fund is called a "radio fund" but it should be a fund large enough to cover all last minute emergencies. Ample financing by interested which they have declined to disclose, the promoters of the school juggling bill are not stopping at any untruth or perversion of fact to gain a vote here and there.

In their Sunday night appeal, H. Ashley Ely, their star broadcaster, offered the amazing statement that the Corvallis plant could accommodate the combined enrollments of University and College for years to come without additional buildings—this in spite of the fact that on the transfer of science alone to Corvallis it was found impossible to accommodate professors transferred from Eugene adequately. Mathematics has been lodged in the Dairy building. Several scientists have been compelled to share one cramped office space where desks are placed end to end. One man doing important research work in biology has been compelled to keep his laboratory in Eugene and commute to classroom work in Corvallis.

A studious effort is being made to give the impression that the buildings of the Eugene campus have been condemned, although in the same breath these impostors talk of using the Eugene buildings for a "teacher college" to be as large or larger than the University.

On the air, in the newspapers, wherever the propaganda of these hidden interests makes its appearance, it must be met and met promptly, and that is why cash funds are being received at Little Deady. Big or small, the contributions are needed and needed as badly as in those days back in '73 when the pioneers were contributing cows and pigs and chickens and bags of produce to build the original Deady. The fight is on and it is a fight which affects every person who owns a home or makes a living in Eugene or Lane county.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY CONTEST.

FOR district attorney in Lane county, the Republicans are offering W. H. Brooke and the Democrats Donald Young. The present incumbent is not a candidate. Here is a sketch of each candidate:

W. H. Brooke—born in Wisconsin in 1880 and got his schooling in that state. Took his law degree at the University of Wisconsin in 1904 and came to Oregon after graduation. Settled at Ontario in Malheur county and practiced there until 1923 when he moved to Eugene. Was in the legislature from Malheur county 1909 and 1911. Was district attorney for Grant, Harney and Malheur counties in 1912. Delegate to 1916 and 1920 Republican national conventions and in 1916 was Oregon's member on the platform committee. Married and has six children. Residence is 1865 Longview avenue. Promise is to apply sound law and good judgment to management of office. Personal dry. Believes main duty is to prosecute professional criminal. Would leave detective work in criminal cases to the sheriff's office. Opposed to use of "atolls." Believes economy can be served by efficient work on major cases and elimination of petty trials.

Donald Young—born in Minnesota in 1889 and received his education in that state. Took a law degree at the University of Minnesota in 1912 and came to Oregon and to the city of Eugene on graduation. Has practiced here ever since. Was deputy under District Attorney Ray from 1918 to 1921. Married. Has two children. Lives at 737 East 19th avenue. Personally dry but favors national prohibition. Opposes state repeal. Promises to take personal charge of trying most of the cases. Advocates promptness and common sense in handling the district attorney's work. Believes economies can be made by efficient operation and possibly by slight cuts in salaries of staff.

For district attorney, the main requirements are honesty, industry, "horse sense," and thorough knowledge of the law. We believe both candidates to be quite well qualified for the position. Mr. Young has certain advantages of youth and superior health. Mr. Brooke offers advantages of maturity and well rounded experience.

We recommend Mr. Brooke, as a matter of preference, feeling sure that the client, the people of the county will be well satisfied with his work.

ECONOMY IS THE BATTLECRY.

GOVERNOR MEIER is calling for further curtailments of pay for all state employees, hoping by this means to garner a million dollars to balance falling revenues from income and property taxes which menace all state budgets. The state board of higher education is the first branch of state administration to tune in with the governor. It promises to operate the University, the College and the Normal schools within the present millage and ask for no more special appropriations till depression is past.

Both the governor and the state board deserve hearty commendation and support. There are many valid objections to reducing the already low pay scales of public employees in this state, but it is better to take this course than to try to maintain pay scales at the cost of throwing more people out of work and curbing activities which are of vital importance to the state. We are not facing theories. We are facing practical conditions. The remedy is not ideal but it is better than any of the alternatives.

In public business as in private business, we are suffering from the mistakes of the past. In a period of falling revenues, we are still cursed by the debts and deficits incurred in the past. We have the choice between spreading work and income and going ahead as best we can or trying to maintain a front of normalcy and making unemployment worse.

Lower living costs, to some extent balance all pay cuts, although this is not true in every case. When better times appear there will be many ad-

justments and equalizations to be made. In the meantime, Governor Meier is offering businesslike leadership in meeting the practical difficulty in the manner which will best serve the state.

BUILDING POINTS THE WAY.

A SURVEY and forecast for the building industry in the United States during the next year, just completed by the magazine, American Architect, indicates that the great building trades are about to emerge from the depression.

The survey shows, for instance, that fully \$1,750,000,000 is going to be spent during the next 12 months on new building projects and on modernization work.

"The beginning of the recovery period is here," says the magazine. "Building activity begins its steady, though slow, upward swing during the fall of 1932."

If this survey is correct, it is extremely good news. There can be no real revival without a pickup in the building industry; and, conversely, if the building industry revives, it can be expected to carry other industries up with it.

Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Guatemala and Honduras have celebrated their 11th anniversary of independence. And isn't it about time for another revolution to free them?

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The presidential campaign is warming up—and so are the whispering campaigns.

With very few if any exceptions, all election years have found politicians circulating malicious falsehoods about the opposition's candidate among the mass of credulous voters.

The only pleasant aspect to this ancient phase of politics is that it doesn't seem very effective. Whispering campaigns probably do not change many votes, and there is no good evidence that one ever affected the result in a presidential election. Those best remembered have usually been aimed at candidates who were victorious.

Also, the whispering campaigns of 1932, it appears from reports received here, are singularly free from undercover attacks on the characters and personal habits of the nominees. Apparently no one anywhere is whispering that the candidates are habitual drunkards or faithless to their wives. But whatever the reason for this remarkable omission, it is hardly to be attributed to any increase of civility among politicians.

Origin of the subterranean campaign canards is usually hard to trace, but there is frequently a suspicion that they emanate from a source close up to the party's high command. Either the Republican or the Democratic national committee people can work themselves into high indignation over the other committee's alleged propagation of them.

Sometimes they even take official notice and issue substantiated denials.

Perhaps the chief rumor circulated against Hoover this year has been the allegation that he was a British citizen and had voted in England. Republicans say "millions" of photostatic copies of a page from a London voters' list bearing Hoover's name have been distributed widely.

There is not the slightest evidence that Hoover ever voted in London. Yet Republican Publicity Director Henry J. Allen has felt it worthwhile to issue a new denial by Assistant Secretary of State Castle, who said he had checked the records again.

The British voting charge was old stuff, having been investigated and denied by Secretary Kellogg in 1928.

Another revival from 1928 is the absurd yarn that a ranch of Hoover's in California put out a sign saying "No White Labor Need Apply." Also, according to G. O. P. leaders, "millions" of scurrilous post cards are being mailed which malign Hoover for his eviction of the bonus army.

Al Smith suffered far worse than Hoover from whispered attacks in 1928, but no one supposes they cost him the election, even though they were as vicious and absurd as any barrage of false gossip ever laid down at an individual. And no one supposes that whispering campaigns will decide the contest of 1932.

Democrats say the Republicans have been spreading lies about Roosevelt's health, also having an undercover attack against Jack Garner, the assertion that Garner would be sure to complete the Roosevelt term. Roosevelt has pretty well vitiated that one by his vigorous western swing, which made everyone realize that his health was excellent despite his lameness.

Catholic Democrats have been told that Smith's defeat and Roosevelt's nomination were the result of a Ku Klux plot and that the way to be loyal to Al was to rebuke Roosevelt.

Democratic headquarters also puts in the whispering campaign category the yarn from the west that Roosevelt promised certain farmer leaders to support free silver and abandonment of the gold standard, the bonus and other inflationary measures calculated to scare the conservative east out of its wits.

History tells of other whispering campaigns against Thomas Jefferson, John Quincy Adams, Andrew Jackson, Martin Van Buren, William Henry Harrison, James A. Garfield, Grover Cleveland, Theodore Roosevelt and Warren G. Harding. Usually the rumors involved drunkenness, immorality or negro blood, although Cleveland was also falsely accused of wife beating in the White House.

OYSTERS RARELY CONTAMINATED, THANKS TO MODERN VIGILANCE

BECAUSE oysters used to arrive on the dining room table highly contaminated by sewage, most states and cities have definite laws regulating the sale and production of shellfish.

In the sanitary code of the department of health of New York city, is the statement that no shellfish shall be brought into, held, kept, or offered for sale anywhere in the city without a permit issued by the board of health.

Today, oysters are shipped into New York city from New York state, Connecticut, Delaware, New Jersey, Virginia and Massachusetts. Other sections of the country, too, receive their oysters from these places and also from other states along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and the Gulf of Mexico.

Shippers who want to supply oysters have to submit certificates certifying that the water, flats and shellfish beds are free from contamination. In many places they are forced to show that every handler of shellfish is free from infectious disease in communicable form.

Every package must bear the shipping number, the name of the water from which the oysters were taken, the bed number, and the date on which the oysters were dredged.

Furthermore, health departments are likely to take samples on arrival to make a bacterial study to determine whether or not they are contaminated.

Until ten years ago the sale and consumption of contaminated oysters was common. Today this is exceedingly rare. The chief danger was from typhoid fever, because the oysters were contaminated with sewage which contained germs from people who had typhoid fever.

There was a time when no one dared to eat oysters during a month without an "r," for the simple reason the germs tended to multiply more rapidly in hot weather than in cold.

Nowadays with good refrigeration and with proper inspection of oyster beds and with definite rules regarding the handling of shellfish, it is safe to eat oysters almost anywhere at any time.

The oyster is a valuable food because it is especially rich in certain vitamins, in iodine, and in nutritious protein.
