

COUNTY CHAMBER STANDS BY ROAD FUND AGREEMENT

COTTAGE GROVE, Oct. 20.—(Special)—The contract between Lane county and the state highway commission, whereby the state body advanced money, without interest charges, for completion of main highways of the county, was unanimously adopted by a largely attended meeting of the Lane county chamber of commerce held here Wednesday night.

Elmer Maxey of Springfield, speaking for the road committee of the county chamber, explained that the county chamber had endorsed and unanimously urged the county court to enter into the agreement, at a public meeting held for the purpose of considering the proposal, before the county court proceeded to enter into the contract. Mr. Maxey urged that inasmuch as the contract was a child of the county chamber, it should at this time reaffirm and re-state its position in opposition to statements which have been made to the effect that something had been "put over" on the county.

Following a talk on the West freight and truck bill by L. B. Smith, Portland attorney, representing the allied truck owners, the chamber adopted, without a dissenting vote, the recommendation of the road committee that the chamber go on record against the bill.

Mr. Smith said that the bill is difficult to understand, that it makes provisions which are contradictory; that it provides for a thorough investigation upon which taxes against trucks and buses are to be assessed, and then goes ahead and puts rates into effect without any such investigation; that trucks serving small mills in Lane county, and those truck-served small mills which give employment to a large number of persons, would be put out of the business by the bill, which he characterized as the progeny of the railroad interests. He feared that the 90-day revocable permit feature of the bill would not be sufficient protection for trucks serving sawmills.

Following addresses by O. S. Fletcher, county agent, and Miss Gertrude L. Skow, home demonstration agent, in which each described his and her work in detail, motions were unanimously adopted expressing the appreciation of the chamber of that work. Sam Lehman, Junction City, reporting for a committee appointed to investigate delinquencies on real property, said that little progress had been made but that a report probably would be ready for the November meeting, which will be held at Willakene grange hall.

Senator Ed W. Miller, of the Coast Highway association, spoke briefly in favor of the Rogue river fish bill, which he introduced in the legislature, and told of the returns of the tourist crop, which he said is becoming one of the state's greatest producers of revenue. He said the turnover in 1931 was \$54,000,000 and probably will be \$30,000,000 during 1932. A feature of the meeting was "Ole Geremonte's Westfir Loggers" who gave musical numbers throughout the evening. Elbert Bede, vice president, presided.
