some money by thus doing. This money I invested in income property and was independent until high taxes have ruined by income, as they have ruined the incomes of many others, consequently I am for tax-reduction.

Ethics Held O. K. "Mr. Emery asks if my buying of timber was ethical. My opponent, Judge Barnard, has made several real estate deals while holding office as county judge, one during the past few weeks. This was not only ethical, Mr. Emery, but Judge Barnard's own business, and own personal affairs. Holding office does not bar one from private transactions.

Mr. Emery cheerfully points out a business transaction of mine, wherein he says on Nov. 24, 1906, Fred Fisk as sheriff sold to Fred Fisk the NW 1/4 of Sec. 16, Tp. 20, S. R. 6 W. 160 acres for \$11.57, and that on November 20, 1906, just two days later Fred Fisk sold to Starrett & Hovey this same 160 acres for \$2500.

Half Truth Charged "The real facts about the transaction are as follows: I bought the NW 1/4 of Sec. 16, Tp. 20, S. R. 6 W. on Sept. 16, 1902, in book 56 at page 49; I sold the same on No. 20, 1906, four years later to Starrett & Hovey. When I went to sell this property, the abstract shows a flaw in my title, and an old tax certificate to J. R. Marley, dated in 1893 was outstanding against the same. This tax certificate was for \$11.57, and in order to clear the title, I was compelled to buy up this old tax certificate, and in order to make a clear title was advised by my attorney to take a deed on my certificate and this corrective deed was recorded Nov. 24, 1906, and the transaction was closed November 26, 1906, some four years after I bought and owned the property. A perfect legitimate transaction.

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RULES SET UP FOR STUDENT CAR USE

Regulations by which student use of automobiles on the campus of higher education will be guided were set up at a meeting of the joint faculty committee of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college at Johnson hall here Friday.

The rules were announced by Carlton E. Spencer, chairman of the faculty of the university.

"The provision that motor vehicles shall not be used on the campuses on school days does not, at the present time, exclude cars from the streets adjacent to the campus at Eugene nor from the parking space near the Administration Building," said Mr. Spencer.

"If necessity arises, additional restrictions will be made.

"The term school days includes from Monday morning to Friday evening, except holidays.

"Provision is being made for the refund of the \$1 automobile registration fee paid by students prior to the modification of the boards ruling. Announcement regarding this will be made later."

Following are the rules established by the committee:

1.—All motor vehicles in the possession or control of students shall be registered with the enforcement officer. Details for registering cars at registration time will be formulated.

2.—A sticker for the vehicle will be issued without charge to each student at the time of registering the car.

3.—Student motor vehicles shall not be used on the campuses on school days. Provisions for making excep-

tions will be formulated by the committee of the respective institutions.

4.—Permission to use a motor vehicle will be withdrawn in every case where it plays a detrimental part in a student's scholarship, discipline, social life, or general welfare. This will be invoked in connection with all forms of violation of campus regulations and traditions. All institutional officers and committees having the administration of regulations, or in any way connected with student welfare, will have the use of cars in mind. This will be particularly true of the scholarship committee, discipline committee, housing committee, and the like.

5.—General supervision will be exercised over the use of motor vehicles by students both on and off the campus.

6.—Traffic violations both on and off the campus will be penalized.
