

WOMEN RECITAL HAS VARIETY AND CHARM

Miss Glen, lyric soprano sponsor of the Ma Phi Epsilon, appeared in a recital Thursday evening at the music building. Miss Glen has a voice of surprising power and commanding dramatic feeling. Her program revealed excellent taste in program building and gave full scope to her wide range of interpretive powers. Miss Glen began with the sparkling "Die Zwillinge" by Schubert. Her recital of mood was noted in "Liebe Ist Grün" by Brahms. The "Chanson de Printemps" of Camille Saint-Saëns introduced Miss Glen's French group. The Chopin "Prélude," adapted from the piano in E major, revealed effective touches, and its serious mood contrasted well with the naïvely happy and charmingly sunny "Chanson de Printemps" which followed. The "Si Tu Le Veux" by Debussy gave evidence of Miss Glen's artistry. "Syncope" by Kjeifelt, Miss Glen was particularly at home in a quasi recitative style and her emotional sincerity. "The Song" by Grieg, Miss Glen's "Jeg Elsker Deg" pleased her dramatic life, as did also Hagerman's "Do Not Go, My Love." Miss Glenn particularly delighted her audience with her Strauss numbers, real tests of artistry. The song of her voice in "Allerseelen" and her recitation in "Zueignung" proved a fitting climax to this excellent program. The other encores, both charmingly done, were "The Bird" by Sharp and "The First Primrose" by Grieg. Miss Glen was accompanied by John Stark Evans, who won the audience by his sympathetic and truly artistic playing. Particularly satisfying were the accompaniments to the Strauss and Strauss numbers. MILL OPERATIONS INCREASE IN WEEK

SEATTLE, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The report of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association for the week ending October 15 today showed that a total of 322 mills reporting to the association operated at 24.4 per cent of capacity compared to 23.8 of capacity the previous week. Unfilled orders decreased 6,051,000 feet from the previous week. Inventories increased 330,000 feet from the week ending October 8. New domestic cargo orders increased 1,354,000 feet. A delegation of lumbermen planned to leave tonight for Chicago to attend a public hearing October 25 on application of the West Coast Lumbermen's association for a substantial reduction in east-bound lumber rates. The Western Pine association, Portland, and the California Redwood association, San Francisco, also have made similar applications.

DOG LOST FIGHT TO SAVE MASTER FROM MAD BULL

LATAH, Wash., Oct. 21.—(AP)—The story of a German shepherd dog's successful fight to save his master from death on the horns of a bull was told here today. George Miller, 78, one of the earliest settlers of this region, was driving cows on his farm near here yesterday afternoon when the bull charged him. The dog, following the aged man, sprang to his defense, but not before the animal gored him. The dog drove the animal away, holding him at bay until Mrs. Miller and a son, who witnessed the tragedy from a distance, summoned help. Miller died 12 hours later. Miller, who came to this region from Oregon more than 50 years ago, had been prominent in public affairs, having held numerous school district and county offices. His widow, three sons and four daughters survive him.
