bonds, and requires the county court to make provision in the budget for the successful carrying on of his office, and, hence, any bill incurred by him in line of duty must be paid by the county.

"Among the items provided for in the general fund only the following are optional:

Agriculturist	\$2,500.00
County fair board	5,500.00
District home agent	1,100.00
Health service	8,850.00
Predatory animals	400.00
Whistle	1,500.00
Traffic patrol	2,100.00
U. S. labor bureau	100.00
4-H club work	2,250.00

"In other words, if the people demanded or if the court would arbitrarily act, this \$24,830.00 could be taken from the general fund item, leaving \$237,171.00. Now if those officers, the assessor, sheriff, clerk, treasurer, circuit court, county court, etc., all required by law, could make a cut, say of twenty per cent, there would be a further deduction of \$47,434.20. Some candidates say they can, but it is easy for the fellow on the outside looking in to make wild statements, and it is mainly done to get votes. Once in office, these candidates would find that it could not be done.

"The law further provides for a road fund of, at least, one mill which for this year would amount to \$48,539.29. The law further requires the county court to turn over to each city and road district one-half of the taxes paid by it into the general road fund. The part going to the cities the court has no jurisdiction over. So, of the \$194,400.00 road fund, which is \$145,541 more than mandatory, the county's share is \$97,200.00.

"By way of explanation, this \$97,200.00, with the road districts' share of the road fund, and what special taxes are voted by the road districts, must take care of the maintenance and up-keep of 912 miles of county roads, as well as help provide work

for some 1500 families during the winter, who otherwise would go hungry. The \$82,620.00 budgeted for the market road fund must take care of the maintenance of 476 miles of market roads and any new construction done. The state of Oregon, by way of compensation, is sending \$900,000, approximately, per mile in maintenance and up-keep of its roads, so with only a small part of this amount available for county roads, at best, we feel that for years our maintenance cost has been at a minimum. As a matter of fact, more should be done in the way of road and bridge up-keep. It would not be another expense but an investment.

"However, if demanded, and the people were willing to forego their roads, \$145,541.00 could be cut from the general road fund, and \$82,620.00 from the market road fund by the county court, even though the budget committee might object.

"So, in summarizing, the county court has jurisdiction over the following, and is responsible for this part of the tax rate only:

One candidate has said many times that as a member of the county court he would reduce the budget \$250,000.00. Well, he would have \$299,010 to be responsible for.

But, giving the benefit of the doubt that the functions of government required by law could be cut 20%, we add

"Or, in other words, by any stretch of the imagination, the county court could be responsible for a little more than 30% of the tax levy.

"Now, on top of the county budget, we have the school districts, road districts, port district and cities with their various functions, a bond issue, etc., which all affect your taxes to the amount of \$369,338.48, over which the county court has absolutely no control, or in other words, the county court has to do with less than fifteen per cent of your taxes as a whole—different cities or districts would fluctuate some, i. e., a taxpayer of Cottage Grove with an assessed valuation of \$1,000.00 would pay taxes as follows:

State and county (of which the court is responsible for only, and at most, \$6.13)
