

POULTRY MEETINGS PLANNED THIS WEEK

Poultry meetings will be conducted at four different points in the county this week by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, and H. E. Cosh, extension poultry specialist at the Oregon State Agricultural college.

The Eugene meeting will be held under the sponsorship of the Eugene Poultry Producers' association and the Junction City meeting will be conducted in cooperation with the Junction City local of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers association.

converge on Saddleblanket mountain from different directions.

Foster Steele, assistant supervisor of the Cascade national forest, awaited word from Lightfoot Monday afternoon. Eugene men will probably aid in the search if the 12-man crew is unsuccessful.

Country is Rough

Mr. Steele said that Nathanman would have to cross some trail no matter which way he wandered. All would lead him to either a forest station or a ranch. But the country is very rough, with steep ridges and deep canyons, and it would be easy to pass through the country without seeing the trails. The fact that the missing man has not turned up at ranches has led hunters to believe he is injured.

Snow covers the ground in the high altitudes near the mountain.

There is a possibility, Mr. Steele said, that Nathanman may have taken refuge at Winberry ranger station or Givout camp. These posts have no telephones, so word could not have been received from them. The nearest telephone is at the lookout station on the mountain, but it is improbable that he climbed up to it. Telephones along trails have been switched off for the winter, and Nathanman would have to throw in the switch to use them. If he is not familiar with forest phones, he may have been unable to call in.

Nathanman's brother came to Eugene from Woodburn Sunday and is in the hunting party.

where the entire debt question is expected to be aired.

Interpellations on the debt question—the December payment of \$20,000,000 in interest on the debt to the United States—are expected to be deposited in the chamber.

Opinions Divided

Opinion as expressed in authoritative quarters appears to be divided into three categories here:

1—That France should make no payment of the December interest because it would serve as a dangerous precedent and create the belief that the entire debt will be paid.

2—That the payment due in December should be made with the reservation that this payment be

takes into account when the debt is finally adjusted.

3—That negotiations regarding debts between the United States and France should be hurried immediately after the American elections on November 8 with the hope that the problem would be solved before the date the interest is due, December 15.
