Man Buried Under Car Digs His Way Out With His Hands

COTTAGE GROVE, Oct. 25.—(Special.)—To be buried in snow for an hour with a fractured rib, a sprained leg, with an automobile on top of him and have to dig his way out with his bare hands was the experience Saturday of Louis Dodge, fireman at Musick for the U. S. forest service.

Following a severe storm and a light fall of snow in the Bohemia mining district, where the Musick mine is located, Mr. Dodge was bringing his car out below the snow line to leave it there until he completed building a ranger cabin upon which he has been employed since the end of the fire season. The car went off the grade and tipped over with Dodge underneath. One hand was pinned down by a running board and one foot was pinned down by a wheel. He used his bare hand to dig the snow away and release his other hand, after which he was able to dig away the snow and release his foot.

It was an hour before he had dug away sufficient snow so he could crawl from under the car, all the time fearing that it might sink further into the snow and hold him there and knowing that no one might pass for days to give him aid. One finger was severely frosted digging in the snow. Help arrived a few minutes after he had extricated himself.
