Budget Group Named
Citizens appointed to the budget committee are as follows: Darwin Reistow, H. L. Edmunds, Alton F. Baker, John W. Anderson, A. A. Rogers, George Schaefer, A. L. Williams, Robert M. Fischer, Jr., and Dr. A. M. Smith. The committee will meet with the council and the mayor to consider the city budget for the coming year.
Upon recommendation of Councilman Zumwalt, a house at 1432 Villard was condemned as a nuisance and it was decided to set the next council meeting as a time for a hearing on the matter before ordering the razing of the building. At that time anyone with objections to the destroying of the place will be heard.
The council voted to increase the monthly allowance to the Decker Community service from \$15 to \$25, and to pay half the cost of installing

a new range. This amounts to \$25, the county paying the other half.
