Matilda Lou Henderson Mrs. Matilda Lou Henderson died

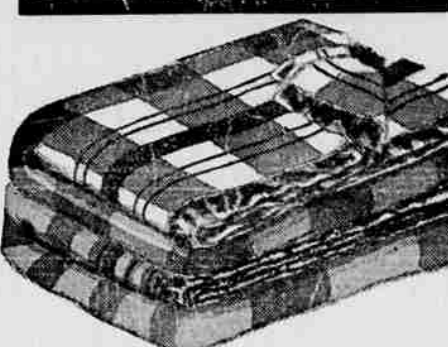
Wednesday at her home in Cottage Grove, at the age of 68 years.
