

FORMER EUGENEAN KILLED IN YREKA DURING GUN PLAY

guns, reminiscent of the
event, brought death to Robert
Zimmerman, 30, at Happy Camp, near
Thursday, as the former Eu-
ganean and two others, assertedly

Eugene police definitely linked the
men to a punch board racket
and here recently, the details of
the case were similar to the one they
said to have been working at.

According to the story received
from two men installed a punch board
service station at the town of
near Yreka, operated by W.
Shadbourne, a deputy sheriff.
The two men proceeded to
Happy Camp where they installed an
amusement station, Wednesday. Zimmerman,
L. E. Scott and Cecil
Smith, appeared at Shadbourne's
station and won \$90 off the
game. Becoming suspicious, he fol-
lowed the three to Happy Camp
where he saw them win \$40 off that
game.

At this point Shadbourne pulled his
gun on the three and arrested them.
Two constables entered and see-
ing Shadbourne with his gun on the
men, mistook the scene for a hold-up
and opened fire on the deputy. As
Zimmerman fell, his bullet
struck in the heart of Zimmerman.
A deputy was dangerously wounded.
No trace of Zimmerman or anyone
else who has been found here,
said Elmer Geiger, of the city
police, said Friday. However, some
