

ZORN-MACPHERSON SCHOOL WRECKERS EMPLOY DECEPTION

MONMOUTH, Ore., Oct. 28.—(Special)—Further efforts of deception on part of the Zorn-MacPherson Tax Reduction League group in effort to put over the Zorn-MacPherson school juggling bill has just been revealed here in letters received from R. B. Swenson, editor of the Monmouth Herald, from Guy Stanton, dean of the graduate school of the University of Minnesota.

Ford has been widely quoted in advertisements and on the radio by both the Zorn and Tax Reduction League representatives as having endorsed the Zorn-MacPherson bill, which would wreck Oregon's present educational institutions and replace them by four new institutions of higher education.

Instead of being in favor of the bill, it now stands revealed that executives of the Tax Reduction League were in possession of a letter from Ford in which he characterized one section of the Zorn-MacPherson bill as a piece of "political juggling that could not be defended on educational grounds for a single moment" and in which he further stated that he "doubted very much" whether he should favor the measure if he were engaged in making a school consolidation.

With Ford's denial of endorsement and condemnation of a portion of the bill in their possession, it is charged that proponents of the measure deliberately proceeded to practice deception on the voters by employing statements made by Ford for "consolidation as a general proposition."

Exposure of this newest distortion of facts came about as a result of a personal letter which Swenson wrote to Ford asking him for the facts. In reply Ford enclosed copies of two letters previously written to proponents of the school juggling bill and in addition wrote a personal letter to Swenson in which he stated "You can see from what I said with the bill before me, that the location of the law school looked so apparently like a piece of pie rolling that it would destroy one's confidence in the rest of the bill. As I look it over (the bill) I should feel that it was so complicated and attempted to do so many things that it would be doubtful whether it would carry in a state election."

Dean Ford writing his first letter endorsed the general idea of consolidation to the Zorn-MacPherson Tax Reduction League group on September 8. At that time he did not have a copy of the bill in his possession and wrote in reply to a general letter asking his opinion according to information available here. After he had received a copy of the bill in October, he immediately wrote to the same people and explained his stand on the measure and condemned Section 7 of it in the following statement:

"In my letter to you I spoke vigorously for consolidation as a general proposition and with special reference to the prevention of the extensive duplication and futile types of college work that are developed when one turns out teachers' colleges in every section of the state. However, if I were engaged in consolidation I doubt very much whether I should be in favor of the initiative measure, a copy of which you enclose. I don't like section seven, for instance. It may be true, and it is probably true that Portland is the logical location for a medical school desiring clinical advantages, but locating the law school in Salem away from the other units of the state university is a piece of political juggling that could not be defended on any educational grounds for a single moment."
