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Cottage Grove, were endeavoring to evolve some way of financing

mineral values from the ores of the Bohemia district, came word that H. Boldon, resident of this city 10 years ago, was on his way here with a carload of machinery that

revolutionize the separation of minerals, that he would, without asking a cent of help from anyone, install a plant at the Lead-Crystal, where mining operations have been under way for two years.

Mr. Boldon has since arrived and the carload of machinery is expected to reach here within a day or two. The portion to be installed at the Lead-Crystal will be rushed into the mining district to get it there as soon as possible.

In addition to the machinery for the Lead-Crystal, equipment will arrive at the same time for the establishment of a laboratory.

The first run at this laboratory probably will be on a quantity of free milling ore which has been brought here from the Noondax mine and this

Boldon and associates have contracted to handle 30,000 tons at the Lead-Crystal, where a million tons are already in sight. After this operation has proved successful and profitable

The machine which, if successful, will make a humming camp of Bhemia within the next year is a specific gravity separator. It was invented

30 years ago for handling ores but for some reason has never been applied to that purpose but has been used for grading seeds, coal, grain and dry commodities of various kinds. During the past year or two exper-

ments with ores have been conducted at Cleveland, O., and so convinced Boldon that the machine will take the place of flotation plants, cyanidizing plants, and stamp mills that he has come here to make his home and has brought two other families with him.

One is the H. J. Brugameyer family of Cleveland and the other is the F. Cookert family of Pittsburgh. Merrill Green is also coming from Cleveland to be employed in the operation.
