each campus, with the chancellor at the head of the system acting as coordinating officer.

No Appropriations
"The objective of the state board for the coming biennium will be to give the young of the state as fine an education as is possible under present economic conditions," Dr. Kerr said. "It is realized that economy is the great need today, and conditions in higher education will be governed accordingly. The institutions will conduct their business entirely on funds from the millage and other funds such as student fees and we will not ask the legislature for any money this year."

"The single higher education board has proved its ability to cope with conditions today. When the referendum cut off legislative appropriations in 1931 which would probably have meant shutting down the medical school and the normals, the single board was able to re-allocate funds and keep all divisions going."

Duplication Eliminated
"The board has been successful in eliminating duplications, ranging from 22 to 50 per cent in many cases, and has substituted for competition harmony and cooperation. With this objective, I feel that the higher education in Oregon is well on the road to success and will be supported by the people of the state."

Speaking for the state board of higher education, C. L. Starr, president of the body, declared that the board's present program, the result of three years of study and investigation, is designed to utilize to the utmost efficiency the physical plants of the institutions. The purpose is to insure harmony and cooperation, and to eliminate rivalry and duplication, he pointed out, and under the present program these objectives are expected to be achieved.

Mr. Starr also expressed the confidence of the board in the ability of Chancellor Kerr, who he pointed out, has served the state in a highly efficient manner for the past 25 years, and he predicted the same success for the chancellor in his new position.

Mrs. Jacob Kanzer, president of the Oregon Mothers, brought greetings from that group; Robert Hall, president of the Associated Students, spoke for the student body, and Alexander G. Brown brought greetings to the "dads" from the alumni.

COMMISSIONER HAS STATEMENT ABOUT ROAD, SCHOOL PLAN

County Commissioner O. E. Crowe Saturday issued a statement outlining the views of the county court on administration of road and school matters. He answered criticism made by the Crow Tax league on the appointment of road patrolmen and showed that rural districts usually get more money out of the county pocketbook than they put in. The statement follows:

"Recently in your paper there have appeared certain resolutions passed by the Crow Tax league, and an article signed by Delmar B. Gates.

"The evident intention of these articles at this time, of course, is obvious, but leaves the impression that the people in the Crow neighborhood and other districts have been treated badly by the present county court. Now, for their information, as well as the voters of the county, I want to call attention to what the records of the court house show.

"By way of illustration, we will take the year 1930. There are four road districts in and around Crow, and during the year 1930 these four districts paid into the road funds of Lane county, the sum of \$11,334.24. During the same year the county court spent on these four districts the sum of \$50,132.64, on roads—construction, maintenance and upkeep—vitaly important to the community and Lane county.

"The records further show that in the five school districts in and around Crow, and Union high school No. 3, the taxpayers of said district paid into the school funds \$2,508.00, and received back \$7,701.85. Under the law this is only right, but rural districts should appreciate their position, and I feel sure that most of the people of Crow are duly appreciative.

"In a previous article in your paper in which I analyzed the tax levy and showed that the majority of all taxes is required by law, and since the legislature will soon be in session, we are asking the Crow Tax league to state whether or not they want the present laws providing for the raising and distribution of road and school money left as it is, or shall the law be changed so that each road and school district get back an amount equal to that contributed by them, so as not to compel the remaining taxpayers of the county to contribute to the support of their roads and schools. Think it over."

"The court, after going over and advising together, leaves administration of the road funds pretty much to the commissioner who has charge of that particular part of the county in which the road districts lie, and the Crow section of the county is in my charge. I feel that the district has been fairly treated by the county court, and further believe that the men as patrolmen have given as good satisfaction as anyone in the district could give, and that under their supervision the district has received one hundred cents of road work for every dollar spent.

"Contrary to what Mr. Gates, vice-president of the league, says, the court does not take an arbitrary stand on patrolmen. We do take into consideration any petition or representation on the part of the people in a district, and where these representations are found to be detrimental to the best interests of those concerned, a change is made. Generally, however, personal animosities, petty jealousies, misinformation, or 'somebody wants the job' is the base of the trouble.

"In the matter of petitions, very often fifty percent of the signing one petition will sign both, and sometimes real community brawls have arisen over these contests, which is bad for everybody, and the court, in order to keep things in order, have to go outside of the dispute and get a third man for patrolman.

"No, it is absurd to say the county court is not considerate of the wishes of the people—the court is very interested that the part of the road men are appointed as patrolmen.

Gobbitt Rips Through
Oregon's second touchdown came in the third quarter. Temple had returned a poor Gonzaga kick 15 yards to the Gonzaga 20 yard line and a pass from Temple to Papenjak netted 21 yards and put the ball on Gonzaga's nine-yard line. Gobbitt ripped through right guard for the touchdown and Brown's kick accounted for the extra point.

With the score 13 to 0 against them, Gonzaga went into action. Hughes kicked off to the Gonzaga 34 yard line where Key, substitute halfback, was downed in his tracks. He took the ball through the line for 5 yards on the first play, however, and Oregon was penalized 15 yards for roughing. With the ball on the Webfoots' 11 yard line, Key threw a long, soaring pass to Capt. Billy Wilson, who raced

15 yards for a touchdown. The kick went wide.

Gonzaga Opens Up
Gonzaga threatened again just before the end of the quarter when Max Etter, substitute halfback, broke through Oregon's line for 30 yards. He was finally brought down on the Oregon 37.

As the fourth quarter started, Etter went wide around left end for another 12 yards, and a pass from Peterson to Frazier, called good because Oregon interfered with the receiver, put the ball on Oregon's 21. On a short lateral pass from Etter, Gonzaga advanced to Oregon's 15 yard line and Peterson went through the center of Oregon's line for nine yards and a first down.

Koska had already entered the game and Mikulak was sent in to help stem the tide, but Etter cracked the line for four more yards. The Bulldogs were finally stopped for downs on the Webfoot six yard line.

Dope Shows Edge
The statistics give Oregon a big edge on scrimmage plays, but give Gonzaga a lead on passes.

Oregon gained 214 yards from scrimmage to Gonzaga's 111. Oregon gained 25 yards from passes to Gonzaga's 73. Oregon's total yardage was 239 and Gonzaga's 184. Each team made eight first downs. Oregon's punts averaged 37 yards to Gonzaga's 38.

Oregon attempted five passes and completed five. Gonzaga attempted 13 passes and completed five. Oregon intercepted three passes. Each team recovered one fumble made by the other, while Oregon also fumbled and recovered its own ball once and Gonzaga fumbled and recovered three times. The starting lineups:
