Brownsville Fire Ruins Reveal Old Time P. O. Records

BROWNVILLE, Nov. 2.—(Special)—Casual searches in the ruins of the postoffice, recently burned here, found records of the postmaster in 1888. C. E. Stannard, postmaster of one of its first classes, began clerking in a store at Brownsville in the same year, and in 1888 opened a small notion store in connection with the postoffice. Since that time he has been continuously in business at Brownsville and is at present the senior member of the mercantile firm of Stannard and Son.

Mr. Stannard has been connected with business enterprises here for about 55 years. The store which he now heads celebrated its 51st anniversary of organization this year with a profit-sharing sale.

The postoffice document discovered here bearing the name of Mr. Stannard under date of 1888 shows also the signature of the notary public, H. J. C. Averill. Curiously enough Mr. Averill was the father of the Brownsville girl to whom Mr. Stannard was in 1881 united in marriage. In 1901 Mr. and Mrs. Stannard observed their golden wedding anniversary.
