

PAGING MR. EMERY
BRIDGEFIELD, Ore.—(To the Editor)—The following is an open letter to Chas. M. Emery in reply to his letter, The Register-Guard, of Oct. 21st.
 My Dear Mr. Emery:

Since my indorsement of Fisk and under somebody's hide, and you as head healer for the powers that be the republican party have addressed the open letter to me through the medium of Lane county's leading paper, The Register-Guard, of Oct. 21st. I will at this time try and enlighten you on at least some of your questions. Your first desire seems to be to know just who the writer is. I would defy the republican machine in Lane county by endorsing a democrat for office. I was born and raised in Lane county and have been a republican voter for 25 years. My republican vote paid taxes directly and indirectly in Lane county ever since I was 16 years of age in amounts varying from a few dollars to nearly \$500 per year.

Your letter seems to try to leave the impression upon my defist in the primaries, but such is not the case, for the joy of support that I received in the county outside of Eugene was extremely gratifying to me. If you will look up on the primary returns, you will find that I carried this part of the county by nearly 800 majority in three cornered race and a number of precincts gave me majorities as high as 12 and 1 and one precinct 20 to nothing. I also carried Mr. Hurd's own home precinct carrying a vote of 88 to 12 in face of a bitter campaign of slander and vilification carried on against me by one or three of Mr. Hurd's two by now political henchmen.

The balance of your questions were believed answered fully and effectively by the Fisk in the Register-Guard of Oct. 22nd. Now Mr. Emery, the writer has known Mr. Fisk ever since he was sheriff during his first term and you are the only man to my knowledge that has ever cast a reflection on his character.

The writer is opposing the election of Mr. Barnard and Mr. Hurd, not because I think that they are dishonest, for there has never been any question on that point, and during my primary campaign I defended both of them when their honesty was questioned. My reason in opposing them is that I think they are disingenuous. I have shown your business judgment; they have kept high salaried employees on the payroll at salaries that are not consistent with the times, and are at present paying some of their men \$150 per month when the average lumber and the merchant can hardly find money to pay their taxes. And also the matter of the contract with the State Highway Commission which was entered into in the face of one of the worst depressions that this nation has ever experienced, this contract was made 60 days prior to a general election and increased the county debt \$98,000 without a vote of the people. The only clear provides that our portion of automobile license fees should go to pay interest and principal on any outstanding road bonds, but instead the court assigned this money to the state until this \$985,000 was paid, thereby forcing the tax payer to dig in his pocket for the next ten to fifteen years to the tune of over \$90,000 per year to meet the payments on outstanding bonds as they come due.

This contract was nothing more than a device to force the taxpayer to build these roads whether or not he wanted them. It was a clear breach of public trust or pure robbery of the law; in either case the verdict of the voters should be cast them on November the 8th. Fisk and Young have offered us a new and orderly program of tax reduction and I wish to again at this time urge every voter who supported a tax reduction platform in the May primaries to go to the polls on November the 8th and cast your vote for Fisk and Young for county judge and Young for county commissioner.

That the present tariff of \$4.00 per thousand feet is keeping the foreign lumber out of this country.

That this means the elimination of the convict-labor lumber of Russia.

That this means eventually restoring to Oregon workers in our woods and mills the annual payroll of fifty-six million dollars which they formerly received.

That the \$3.00 of our present tariff automatically expires in 1934 and then we will need Senator Steiwer badly to retain our tariff at that time.

The prolonged depression with its defaulted taxes has seriously reduced the income of most districts, and threatens the rest during the next two years, at least. Nevertheless, the educational needs of rural school children are as great during times of depression as in times of prosperity.

In this critical situation the successful operation of our county schools will depend, to a great degree, upon the skill and capability of the county school superintendent to organize the best possible educational service with the limited funds available.

The democratic nominee for this office, Vera Todd Crow, of Eugene, has a splendid educational background as well as years of successful teaching experience in Lane county and other Pacific coast districts. She has had executive experience in several of Eugene's larger civic organizations. Her well-defined educational ideal and her alert and vigorous personality combine to make her a most suitable candidate for those voters who wish genuine service to come from this office.

The present incumbent of the county superintendent's office, in your issue of Oct. 31, recommends Mrs. Crow's nomination on the grounds, that "he needs the salary."

In the "Mail Bag" of the Sunday morning issue of the Register-Guard appeared a letter composed, and written for Julian Strait, a supporter of Cal Pryor for sheriff, by which he committed himself to a deliberate and malicious falsehood in relation to the nature of a letter written by me and published in the Register-Guard on October 19 in which I exercised the right of endorsing C. A. Tom Swarts, the republican candidate for sheriff. 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ON TRUCK BILL

GOLDSON, Ore.—(To the Editor)

—The one thing that strikes me most forcibly this fall is the apathy of the press and of the general public towards the proposed Freight Truck and Bus bill that will be on the November ballot. For some reason it does not seem to occur to a great many that the success or failure of this measure is a matter of very grave importance to each and every citizen and resident of the state of Oregon. Wake up, Oh! Wake up, ere it is too late and all that is left for us to do is wish that we had an opportunity to do it all over again.

This bill was sponsored and placed on the ballot by parties unknown, hiding behind the front of a "Highway Protective Association," supplied apparently with limitless funds. It is only recently that the general public has been able to quite definitely determine what and who the special interests are that are behind this nefarious measure. From the lists now being published and distributed by the so-called "Highway Protective Association" it is quite apparent that the interests to be served by the enactment of this bill are the RAILROADS and the LARGE LOGGING and TIMBER interests that own and operate their own logging railroads and are independent of both the state and county highway systems for the transportation of their logs and finished lumber. This fact alone speaks volumes.

No more serious blow could be struck at the tax values in Lane county in particular on account of the large timber interests (diversified) here, and in the state in general (not excepting the proposed school moving bill as serious as that is), than the enactment into law of this proposed freight truck and bus bill. It would put the small mills and a great number of the larger ones out of business, shutting out thousands of acres of timber from the market, reducing or totally obliterating its value, and consequently cutting down or entirely removing values from the tax rolls. It would result in a higher price for lumber to our own local consumers, although not sufficient to raise the export price, as Oregon mills would still have to meet the competition of mills in other states, particularly Washington and California. This would naturally retard development in all lines in this state, something we can ill afford.

This is only one phase of the question, however. The enactment of this bill would of necessity, by greatly in-

creasing the expenses of operations for the contract hauler, as well as the common carrier (particularly freight), compel them to very greatly increase rates, and in some cases more than double, in order to remain solvent, and in a good many cases rates could not be increased sufficiently to offset the additional expense they would be put to, on account of railroad competition, which would mean a discontinuance of the service. Do you wish to go back to horse-and-buggy days in order to save the highways for the tourists and the freight business for the railroads? The general public would, of course, have to bear these additional charges and put up with the curtailed service of rail, shoulder the whole additional burden that this bill would impose on it in the name of "protecting them" from fencing them off from their own highways, paid for by their own money.

A wise canary would not vote for it for a keeper. Apparently the sponsors of this freight truck and bus bill are depending on a lot of us not being "wise," and I am very much afraid that they are right, and that we will through prejudice, ignorance of the facts, or just plain inexcusable indifference deprive ourselves of the full use of our \$200,000,000 country plant, our state and county highway systems. Not only deprive ourselves of its full use, but actually curtail all its income by greatly reducing the volume of freight transported over its roads. Oh! the nerve of big money—the oh! mighty dollar—trying to get us to render our own investments nonproductive in order that private interests may earn fat dividends!

Truck transportation is as essential today as railroad transportation. Both are indispensable. Crippling one principle the whole transportation structure. The state of Oregon has two arms; trucks and railroads are her two arms. By crippling one of these arms it is reasonable to suppose that we would thrive better than with both healthy and active, the one supplanting the other? Is it reasonable to suppose that by crippling one we would be in a better position to compete successfully with our neighboring states of Washington and California? It most emphatically is not.
